NOTICE OF FILING APPLICATION FOR A CHANGE IN POINT OF DIVERSION OF WATER

Notice is given hereby that Gene O. Pierce has filed an application for the approval of a change in point of diversion of water from Willow Creek. Certificate of water right issued to James O. Hager and recorded at page 3388, Volume 4, State Record of Water Right Certificates, confirms a right to use of not to exceed 0.06 cubic foot per second of water from Willow Creek, for the irrigation of, among other lands, 2.4 acres in the NE 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 35, Township 2 South, Range 26 East, W.M., with a date of priority of August 23, 1917.

The water is conveyed to these lands by means of the Hager Ditch from a point of diversion located 740 feet North and 400 feet West from the SE corner of SE 1/4 SE 1/4, being within the SE 1/4 SE 1/4 of Section 35, Township 2 South, Range 26 East, W.M.

Pierce, Box 36, Heppner, Oregon, 97836, and one copy filed with the State Engineer, Salem, Oregon, together with a \$5.00 filing fee, at least 10 days prior to the date set for hearing. If no objections are filed, the application may be approved by the State Engineer without a hearing. Administrative rules pertaining to the filing of a protest will be furnished by the State Engineer upon request.

Voters approve fire district tax, 31-12

By FRANCES ROSE WILSON IRRIGON - At the Irrigon Fire District election Monday, 43 voters turned out to pass the request for additional funds for repair and replacement of equipment.

The vote was 31 for and 12 against the increase of tax for one year of 82 cents per \$1,000 valuation.

According to Don Adams, repair work is donated by volunteer firemen but funds were needed to paint and repair the old fire truck.

They answered four fire calls in recent weeks including a mutual aid call to the Ordinance bombing range, grass fires along the highway west of Irrigon, back of Buchanan's, and another back of Partlows.

The Irrigon Rural Fire District includes the area east to the Umatilla County line, south to the Army Ordnance line and west to the Patterson Ferry Road.

The three-day Health Fair held in Irrigon was a success, with 165 persons signing the registration book.

The volunteer staff of 16 young people interested in health and medicine as a career, packed up their booths and display and moved to Heppner Wednesday afternoon to present a Health Fair there for the remainder of the week.

The booths were concerned with many aspects of good health, such as dental hygiene, respiratory diseases, diabetes, drugs, communicable disease, cancer and others. There were leaflets on each subject, which were given to anyone interested.

There were a number of mechanical helps, such as the device to measure lung capacity for air. Another would show plaque on the teeth. One could have blood pressure taken or be tested for anemia or diabetes.

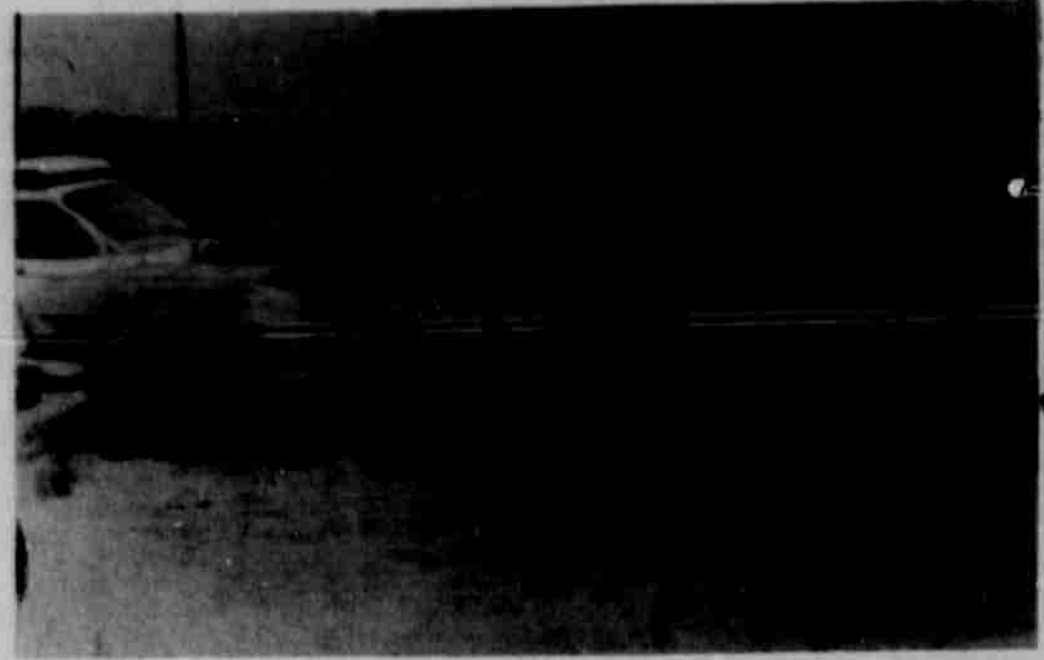
