

# Riverside High dumps Prairie City, 12-8

With 29 seconds remaining in the game, senior Jerry Donovan ran 12 yards for a touchdown to spur the Riverside Pirates past the Prairie City Panthers, 12-8, in their first non-conference game Friday in Boardman.

Mike Wetherell's Pirates took an early lead in the game when they scored on their first possession on a 37 yard run by Jim Graham.

The Pirates held the Panthers scoreless until the second quarter when Quarterback Scott Bates passed to Mike Cameron for a touchdown with only one minute and 30 seconds remaining in the half. Dean Hicks ran for the two extra points, putting the Panthers on top 8-6.

Riverside came back in the second half and held Prairie City's rushing to 20 yards and kept their opponents inside their 40 in the third quarter and to the 20 in the fourth quarter.

The Pirates touchdown came when quarterback

Daryl Frederickson threw the winning pass to Jerry Donovan.

Riverside lead the rushing by carrying the ball 33 times for a total of 157 yards while Prairie City rushed 81 yards in 31 carries. In the passing category Prairie City threw 14 times and completed eight for a total of 116 yards. Riverside completed two passes out of seven for a total of 16 yards.

Jim Graham lead the Pirates in rushing with a total of 80 yards on 12 carries. Teammates Chris Snyder and Mark Mesteth each had eight tackles with Chris getting four assists and Mark with seven. After the game, Coach Mike Wetherell commented that Riverside had no difficulty switching from 8-man to 11-man football. Wetherell was very pleased with the performance of his team, especially with the defensive and offensive linebacks.

Riverside plays host to neighboring Heppner this Friday, 2 p.m., in Boardman.

## Ranchers feed the wildlife

Predators did their bit toward increasing the meat shortage in the period from July 15 through Aug. 11 by taking a total of 286 domestic animals and 175 fowl for their own dining.

Greatest losses were in sheep and lambs with predators taking 49 sheep and 234 lambs. The depredation report given the Oregon Department of Agriculture by the Division of Wildlife Service, Oregon Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, showed Wheeler the only one of the 26 Oregon counties reporting that did not lose either sheep or lambs or both to predators. The county with greatest loss in sheep and lambs was Linn, with five sheep and 48 lambs.

Topping the fowl losses to predators were chickens with a total of 80 and geese came in second. Forty-three geese went for predator dining and all but 12 of them were from Jackson County farms. The 12 were from Washington County. The chicken losses were scattered among nine counties with Benton County's loss of 20 chickens the greatest. Twenty-three turkeys were taken by predators. Other losses in fowl included eight ducks, seven guinea hens, and 15 peacocks. The peacocks were all on Crook County.

Miscellaneous predator damage reported during the July 15-Aug. 11 period included porcupine damage in Jackson County to one prune tree and 12 pear trees; raccoon and opossum damage to sweet corn in Linn County and in Marion County; damage to a fish trip by blue heron and the destroying by fox of pheasants being raised commercially for a game company. The number of pheasants lost was not reported.

The Mustangs scored another TD in the fourth quarter only to have the play nullified by a penalty. In the last minutes of the ball game Joseph was knocking on the Mustangs door; however, the clock ran out giving the Mustangs the win.

This Friday the Mustangs take on the Pirates at Boardman in their first league game. Game time is 2 p.m.
