Need special college courses in Heppner?

The Heppner branch of the American Association of University Women is undertaking a project to encourage more Blue Mt. Community College courses to be taught in Morrow County.

Morrow County residents pay roughly \$179,000 in taxes toward the Community College. The branch feels that local taxpayers could get more for their money if more classes, which people are interested in, were taught locally.

The branch has drawn up a ballot for people to check their interests on and return to Jeannie Howell. Members will then communicate the desires of the people to BMCC Adult Education and Community Service Section so that classes can be set up. Where there are enough for a class, members of the branch will contact those people.

In order for a class to be taught there must be 10 people signed up. Anyone can take these classes, including high school students 16 years of age and over. These students may find this a good way to gain a few college credits.
