

Students open own 'store'

The 3rd grade class at Lone Elementary School is making its classroom into a country store.

The purpose is to study how things are bought and sold. Mrs. Martin, teacher, explained the store is being used to teach arithmetic, social studies, language studies, and even art.

The youngsters take turns being the buyers and the sellers. To make the buying more interesting, the children are first asked to make an estimate of what they think different items, such as breakfast cereal, actually cost. They compare their estimates with actual retail values. They use play money to buy and make change.

Use of the telephone is worked into the project. Students get a chance to call in orders for merchandise and also to practice telephone manners.

The youngsters make posters advertising their wares and making their displays attractive to the buyers.

The children think this is a "fun" way to study consumer

education. They still have the story problem in arithmetic, but this approach gives them new meaning.

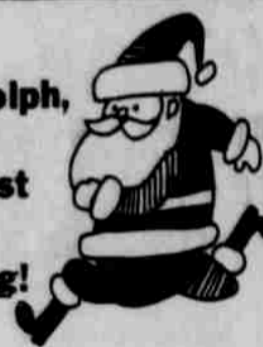
