BANNERS FOR THE CHURCH

The children of the United Church of Christ's Church School have been participating in the worship services during the Advent season.

The junior class made and presented to the church two banners for the wall. The banners were designed by Mrs. Lindsay Kincaid. Holiday vacations extended at BMCC

Blue Mountain Community College's Christmas vacation period has been extended to Jan. 7, according to President Wallace McCrae.

The change was adopted as an energy-saving measure, McCrae said, following the lead of several other colleges in the state of the recommendation of the BMCC student council.

Classes will begin on Jan. 7, he added, urging that students currently enrolled and new students pre-register prior to that date.

"The campus will be open week days through Dec. 20," he continued, "and the admissions office will be open six days during the vacation period so students can register prior to the opening of winter term." Those dates are Dec. 26, 27 and 28, and Jan. 2, 3 and 4.

Other campus offices will be closed during the entire period except Dec. 24 when the college students host a Christmas party for persons who

might otherwise not have a traditional Christmas Eve.

Students with financial problems and those concerned about gasoline were encouraged by McCrae to ask assistance of the college before dropping out of school for either reason. Financial aid is available to all students who qualify.

"We are considering several other steps to meet the fuel shortage," McCrae said, "including car pooling, possible alternate scheduling, and perhaps taking some classes to the west and east ends of our district. Whatever is necessary," he continued, "will be done to assure that our students are properly served."

Prior to the energy-saving schedule, BMCC was scheduled to hold registration on Jan. 2, with classes to start Jan. 3. No class time will be lost by the new schedule, McCrae said. Time will be made up at the end of winter term.
