Tax help available locally

Personnel from the Oregon Department of Revenue will be available in Heppner during January, February, March and April to help homeowners and renters complete their claim forms for the 1973 property tax refund program.

This is part of a statewide department effort to provide convenient assistance to taxpayers who are entitled to the property tax refunds.

Homeowners should bring with them Form 70-R (Refund Claim), which has been mailed with the individual income tax packets to every residence in the state, and a

copy of their property tax statement received this fall.

They should also have with them information about their 1973 income, including a completed federal income tax return (Form 1040 or 1040A) if one is required. Renters should bring the Refund Claim, copies of Form 99-RC (Rent Certificate) obtained from landlords certifying total rent paid during 1973, and the completed federal income tax form if required.

Two-year licenses for cars

Beginning Jan. 2 Oregon will switch to a two-year registration cycle for most motor vehicles and fees will be doubled correspondingly.

The change in registration period and fees is indicated on renewal reminders and owners are urged by the Motor Vehicles Division to check the fee shown on the notice before they mail in their license renewal.

It will now cost \$20 to renew a passenger vehicle license. Car owners with custom license plates will pay \$70 for a two-year registration. Motorcycle owners will pay \$6 instead of \$3. Other types of vehicles subject to the two-year registration are vehicles bearing ham or disabled person license plates, light trailers, travel trailers, campers, motor homes and electric vehicles used for pleasure.
