Vikings muzzle Mustangs, 80-65

Plagued by illness, the Heppner Mustangs lost to the Umatilla Vikings, 80-65, Friday night at Umatilla.

The Mustangs tangled with the tall Vikings in the early minutes of the game but the Vikings pulled ahead 19-12 at the end of the first quarter. The Vikings capitalized on their height and tallied 16 points to the Mustangs' 12 in the following quarter, to take a 35-24 lead at half-time.

The Vikings came back in the third quarter and increased their lead. The visiting team rallied in the fourth quarter by sinking 26 points, but the Vikings topped the fourth quarter scoring with 28 points.

The Mustangs outrebounded the Vikings 35 to 25 with Mike Bergstrom grabbing 12 and John Myers 9. Pat Laffery was Umatilla's top rebounder with 8.

In the shooting category, Umatilla took all honors by converting 55 per cent of their shots from the field and 76 per cent from the free throw line. Heppner shot a cold 38 per cent from the field and a 65 per cent at the line.

John Boyer topped all scorers with 30 points. Heppner's other scorers included Eckman 11, Roberts 2, Myers 10, Bergstrom 6, McLachlan 6, McLeod 0.

Allen Stevens scored 25 points for the Vikings; Pat Laffery added 22.

"We had five members of the team down with illness this week and we couldn't keep up with the Umatilla team whose shooting was on target," said Heppner Coach Dean Naffziger.

"I had to bring Dave McLachlan up from junior varsity to help out with the team which missed John Kilkenny."

The Mustangs got off to an early lead and led the Huskies at the end of the quarter, 22-17. However, the Huskies fought back during the second quarter and as the half ended the Mustangs had a slim one-point lead, 39-38.

In the third period the Mustangs ran into trouble when Mike Bergstrom sprained his ankle and had to be taken out of the game. Bergstrom, along with Boyer, had been doing the rebounding for the Mustangs.

Mustang Coach Dean Naffziger called on his reserves, who in his opinion did a fine job in holding down the Huskies.

As the third quarter ended the Mustangs still held a three-point lead over the Huskies, 57-54.

In the fourth quarter the Huskies managed to out rebound and outscore the Mustangs. During the last period the Mustangs scored 17 points to the Huskies' 20, and as the game came to an end the score was tied 74-74.

After a rest period the game went into an overtime period where the Mustangs fell apart. "Whether they were tired or still not feeling up to par for the game after a bout with illness, I really don't know," said Naffziger, "but we didn't play our type of game."

To confirm his point, the Mustangs scored 38 per cent from the field to the Huskies' 61 per cent.

Boyer was high point man for the Mustangs with 29 points, followed by Myers 14, Eckman 9, Sumner and Munken 8 points each, Bergstrom 6 and Roberts 4.

High point man for the Huskies was Jim Bird with 27 points, followed by Meizer 16, Diles 12, Richenderfer 8, DeGrange and Sharp tied at 4 each, McNab 3, and Burnett and Henry 2 each.

Friday night Heppner meets Wasco County at Heppner. JV game starts at 6 p.m. with the varsity game following.
