won a \$500 scholarship from Pendleton Woolen Mills of Oregon.

Oregon's entry, Vonda Rae Welby, Gervais, was given merchandise award from the American Wool Council.

Kindergarten meeting set for Feb. 12

An important meeting of the Heppner Community Kindergarten is scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 12, 7:30 p.m., at the Heppner Elementary School cafeteria.

Don Cole, Heppner Elementary School superintendent, will discuss the kindergarten's place in the total school budget proposed for 1974-75, and how kindergarten parents can get the facts before the public.

Cole has stressed that property taxes should not be any higher next year although the total school budget will be higher. The first year the kindergarten program is in the school system, cost to the Morrow County school district will be \$20,000. Each year following the cost will be \$11,000 per year because the state will pay \$10,000 of the cost. Cole said 60 per cent of Oregon's five-year olds are currently enrolled in public school kindergartens.

Career day at BMCC, March 2

What do I want to do after high school? Do I want to go to college, or get a job, join the service, or what?

These questions and others will be tackled by high school students at the World of Work Day, March 2, at Blue Mountain Community College.

WOW Day will feature high school freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors from Morrow and Umatilla counties participating in the career day.

Students will be able to obtain information on the many careers awaiting high school graduates.

Teenagers may sign up for three different sessions, according to their interest. There will be more than 140 different types of employment represented. Subject areas include data processing, recreation, health and physical education; home economics, manufacturing and service trade, oceanography, social sciences, engineering and engineering technology, attorneys, law enforcement, arts, education, food services driving occupations, building trades, fish and wildlife, forestry, armed services, science and mathematics, business, sales, finance, telephone operator, dental, medical, cosmetology, mechanics, secretarial, veterinarian, air services, mass communications, agriculture and career information.

One of the subject areas, career information, will allow high school students to talk with college counselors, employment service representatives and high school counselors about career training, requirements and opportunities. A computerized method of identifying career preference will be available. Students will also be able to secure a work permit and Social Security number applications.

Many of the jobs on the agenda do not require a four-year college education and some have on-the-job training or require only a short post-high school preparation.

According to Birdine Tullis, program aide, "Students attending last year's WOW Day found it to be a rewarding, valuable experience."

Morrow County high school students are urged to sign up for WOW Day during pre-registration, Feb. 4-8, at their high schools.

New 'horse book'

Mrs. Eb Hughes reviewed "The Race" for the Bookworm Club at its Jan. 29 meeting at the Ted Smith home.

This novel gives a pretty complete picture of the Kentucky Derby and the week of activities that precedes the big race.

The authors of this 1973 Simon & Schuster publication, Eunice Walkup and Oscar Otis, give the reader much of the excitement of Derby Week and of this annual race at Churchill Downs, Kentucky.

The seven three-year-old horses and their jockeys, the various owners, trainers, grooms, judges, track men, security policemen, and some of the 10,000 spectators are characters in the story. The narrative progresses day by day from the Friday of a week and a day before the big Saturday and its climax, the race.

Woven into the main plot, which deals with the planning and preparations taking place before the running of the derby, are diverse sub-plots. These include the death of one jockey and the substitution of another rider; a wealthy young man's struggle to give up drug usage; problems with a trainer who claims to have given up drinking; and a desperate criminal plot that involves the daughter of the owner of one of the favorites.

This is a book most readers won't want to put aside until they have completely finished reading of America's most famous mile-and-a-quarter race.
