## Work' set for March 2

The annual World of Work Extension sponsored career day for youth is Saturday, March 2, at Blue Mountain Community College.

More than 100 local volunteer resource persons will receive packets of information this week concerning their role in this big event.

Last week junior and senior high school students in Umatilla and Morrow counties had the opportunity to pre-register for three career sessions. They had a choice of 30 different interest areas, which included over 140 different types of employment.

Local men and women will devote a Saturday to conduct the career classes. Youth will have the opportunity to talk informally with the instructors and learn first hand just exactly what a particular job actually entails. Most of the instructors have already been selected. One is Dan Buhman, instructor at BMCC, who will head up the data processing section. In this there will be volunteers to tell about careers as a computer operator, computer programmer, analyst, or key punch operator. James Hatley of Kerns Furniture, and Bud Lewis of

Prowler Industries will speak in the interest area of manufacturing and service trades. In this section there also will be information given on custodian services, hotel-motel maids, kitchen helpers, housekeepers, woolen mills, service stations, trailer-mobile homes and wood products.

Bruce Morgan, U.S. Forest Service, will head up the engineering and engineering technology interest area. Jim Eardley, East Oregonian, and Ted Smith, radio station KUMA, will head the mass communication section. Home economics career will be discussed by Carolyn Ausetz, dietitian at St. Anthony Hospital, Diane Warren, home economist at Eastern Oregon Hospital and Training Center, Debbie Barker and Molly Saul, Extension Service home economists.

The above are only a few of the over 100 local persons who will be at WOW day, March 2, to discuss their employment.

It touched on the first five sections of the book, but did not cover section six, strategies for survival. Mrs. Rawlins led an informal discussion of the book and film.
