

Cardinals edge Grizzlies by 4

The lone Cardinals defeated the Grizzlies 34-30 in a second half comeback Saturday night, 51-47, in a league game at the Cardinals court.

As the first half of play ended the Cardinals trailed the Grizzlies 24-18. The second period of play was even with each team scoring 8 points.

In the third period of play the Cards managed to out rebound Grizzlies and tie up the ball game at 34 each.

In the fourth quarter the Cards took a fast ten point lead. With only a minute left to play, the Grizzlies came back and scored 8 points, narrowing the Cardinals lead to 3 points.

With only 10 seconds on the clock, Charlie McElligott stole the ball and was fouled. He made the two free throws giving the Cards a 4-point lead as the game ended.

Lone shot 34 per cent from

the floor, while the Grizzlies hit 35 per cent. The Cards hit 71 per cent from the free throw line while their opponents scored 62 per cent.

Both teams got high marks for sportsmanship, as there were only eighteen fouls committed by both teams during the entire game.

High point man for the Cards was Mark Rietmann with 16 points, followed by Phil Carlson and Mike Warren with 10 each. McElligott scored 9, Gate 4, and Peterson 2.

Steve Terjeson scored 16 points for the Grizzlies, followed by Wade Mueller with 10, Hartle 8, Weber 5, K. Terjeson 4 and Hawkins 3.

Saturday the Cards battle the Arlington Hawks at Arlington in a non-conference game. Game time is 6:30 p.m. for the JV's, with the varsity taking the court at 8 p.m.
