Winter to step down as DA

District Attorney Herman D. Winter has announced he will not seek re-election as district attorney of Morrow County this year.

Winter will have completed 12 years in office at the end of 1974.

Dennis D. Doherty, who has been engaged in private practice since April, 1972, in Heppner, and who has also served as part time deputy to Winter, has announced that he will be a candidate for non-partisan, four-year term office.

A native of Heppner, Doherty graduated from Willamette University Law School in 1970. The following summer he completed the career prosecutor's course conducted by the National College of District Attorneys in Houston, Texas.

Prior to returning to Heppner, Doherty served one and one-half years as deputy district attorney in Umatilla County.

He and his wife Anne have a 10-month-old son, Benjamin.

Last rites for Fred MacMurray

Funeral services were held Feb. 26 in Portland for Fred L. MacMurray, former Morrow County farmer who died at his home in Portland Saturday.

Born July 23, 1899 near Uree, N.C., he spent his childhood on the family farm with five brothers and six sisters. He followed part of his family to Oregon in April, 1910 and worked with his brothers on a farm in Morrow County.

He served in the U.S. Army during World War I and spent part of his military service on the fighting front in France.

After the Armistice he returned to Eastern Oregon and farmed near Ione. In 1936 he married, Crystal Sparks, and the couple later moved to a farm near Hermiston where they lived until they moved to Portland in 1946. Mrs. MacMurray died in 1961.

Mr. MacMurray was a member of the Ione Masonic Lodge and the Heppner Elks Lodge. He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Blanche E. Werst, Clarkston, Wn., and Mrs. Daisy A. Robinson, Albany, Ore.; numerous nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were conducted at the Jacobson-Cascade Funeral Home in Portland, with interment following in Willamette National Cemetery.
