Farm fertilizer shortage 'real'

The farm fertilizer shortage will apparently create problems for several years, according to H.J. Ostlund, district manager for fertilizer of the Chevron Chemical Co. in Portland.

Ostlund predicted the shortage would last three years, before the supply would equal the farm demand.

Although there is apparently enough sources and supplies of the three main chemicals for fertilizers, phosphorus, potassium, and nitrogen, the problem arises in the extraction and processing of the chemicals.

Ostlund in a speech to the Pendleton Kiwanis also noted that the government may in the future have to establish what crops a farmer may grow to better conserve energy, which includes machinery, fertilizer, labor, electricity and fuels.

The fertilizer problem is currently coupled with a farm machinery delivery problem to produce "one of the strangest years in farm equipment I've ever seen," according to Morrow County Grain Growers' Manager Larry Mills.

A representative of Farmore Service Center in Pendleton reports that farm chemical supplies have been cut by nearly 50 per cent of its last year's total. Other chemical dealers in the area report up to 66 per cent reduction in chemical allocations.

The farm machinery business is also tied to various shortage problems this spring. The truckers strikes slowed down delivery of equipment and the gas shortage has caused concern and confusion at the factories as nearly all vehicles produced have been switched from gasoline to diesel.

Reports from Mountain Machinery and Pioneer Implement companies tell of orders which may not be filled in time for this year's harvest. It now appears the farmer must take the shortages, along with the weather, as a hazard in crop production.

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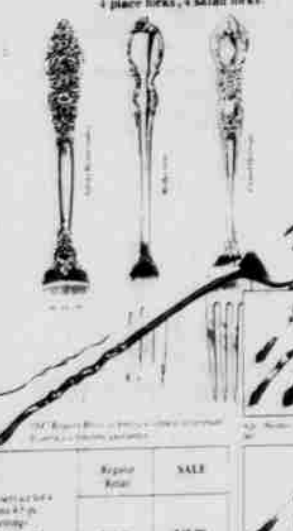
