Bill Lande heads Easter Seal drive

Bill Lande will serve as Easter Seal Campaign Chairman for Morrow County, it was announced here today.

Lande, who is active in Easter Seal work, will begin area-wide organization immediately for the 1974 campaign.

During this time, a statewide appeal for funds is being made by the Easter Seal Society of Oregon to finance treatment and rehabilitation services for crippled children and adults in Oregon.

Last year more than 3,500 handicapped persons received help from the Easter Seal Society. Increased needs of the handicapped and rising costs have placed new demands on the Society.

Funds will support the programs of Children's Hospital in Eugene, equipment loan service, mobile therapy clinics, Camp Easter Seal in Lakeside, the AID program in Portland, housing for the handicapped in Portland, and the pre-school speech and hearing Clinic in Grants Pass.

The Morrow County effort will involve a direct-mail solicitation, a coffee day at local participating restaurants, and a Lily Sale.

"I haven't a doubt in my mind that when the people of Morrow County know what

Easter Seals are doing to make this a better world for crippled children, and crippled adults as well, they will be as generous as their means permit," Lande said.
