Norwegian girl talks of home

Inger Christiansen, 18, an American Field Service student in Hermiston, was guest speaker at the joint meeting of the Topic and Bookworm Clubs, April 3, at the Roy Lindstrom home in Ione.

Introduced by Mrs. Norman Nelson, a recent visitor in Scandinavia, Inger presented a colored slide tour of Norway along with comments and facts about her homeland.

The Christiansen family resides in a rural community in Southeastern Norway. Inger completed six years of lower school and three years of intermediate school in a small city 18 miles from her home where she commuted by school bus. She now attends the three-year upper-school which includes advanced high school and junior college level classes and leads to enrollment in a university. Besides written and oral Norwegian and written and oral English, she is taking instruction in French, German and Latin. Students attend school six days a week, have "plenty of homework every night," and are not accustomed to the variety of activities that Hermiston students have.

Church life is also different at home where there is a state religion and the priests are state-supported. All schools give classes in religion.

Inger wore a native costume of black woolen, elaborately embroidered with a floral pattern. Her skirt, vest and hat had matching embroidery. A white blouse, embroidered handbag, and special silver

jewelry completed her ensemble. She explained that such a costume is only worn on state occasions and is quite expensive.

The Norwegian royal family is very unassuming and very careful of its public relations, she said. She showed some slides of the palace and of the cities of Oslo and Bergen, but most pictures were of Norway's mountains, fjords and woodlands.

Inger reached the U.S. last Aug. 17 along with about 2500 other students from European countries. She will leave Hermiston in June. Last Christmas was her first time away from home. "Christmas is fun in Norway—it seems to be work in the U.S.," she remarked.
