First National deposits rise

First National Bank of Oregon reported increases in deposits, loans and earnings for the first quarter of 1974, according to Robert F. Wallace, president of the statewide banking system.

The Heppner branch reported deposits of \$9,013,332 and loans of \$8,707,909 as of March 31. Comparable totals for the branch a year ago were \$8,097,445 in deposits and \$6,633,201 in loans.

Deposits were \$2,103,016.100 on March 31, compared with \$2,091,658.453 posted at the end of the first quarter of 1973.

Loans at First National's 136 statewide offices moved up to \$1,364,955.164, a gain of 3.1 per cent from the \$1,323,826.008 listed on the same date in 1973. Total resources were \$2,622,850.189, up from \$2,443,374.495 on March 31, of last year.

Income before securities transactions for the first quarter amounted to \$4,789,290, or 90 cents per share, up 19.7 per cent from \$4,000,818, or 75 cents per share, compared to 1973. Net income, after securities transactions, was \$4,804,317. This compares to \$4,001,197 last year.

Idle electric lines to be removed CB

Recent electric line mapping work and load studies by Columbia Basin Electric Co-op have revealed extensive "idle lines" throughout the service area.

These idle lines represent thousands of dollars of investment in labor, overhead and materials for which Columbia Basin receives no revenue. These are lines at locations where the present or past property owner decided that he did not wish the use of electric lines serving his property, and since there were no contractual agreements the electric facilities are not utilized or covered by minimum charges.

Columbia Basin Electric is now inventorying these idle lines and is contacting property owners to plan for removal of the lines unless arrangements can be made to cover some of the line costs. It appears that nearly \$100,000 in unused line facilities could be removed within the next year.

Farm consolidation is a factor in the vacated line picture.

A strict policy on line extensions was adopted by the

board of directors of Columbia Basin a year ago to attempt to avoid future problems with idle lines and idle services.
