Taylor on NSF grant at EOSC

For the first time students at Eastern Oregon State College in La Grande have been awarded a National Science Foundation grant for research studies they initiated themselves.

Under the \$8,300 grant, eight students, of whom five have been chosen at EOSC, will investigate the ecological association of plants and

animals in the Wenaha area for a preliminary study.

Some changes in this year's contest are that individuals may sponsor a nominee. Also

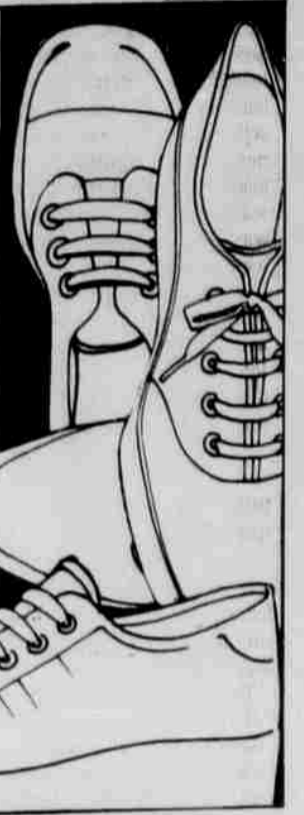
outstanding entries from previous years can be resubmitted.

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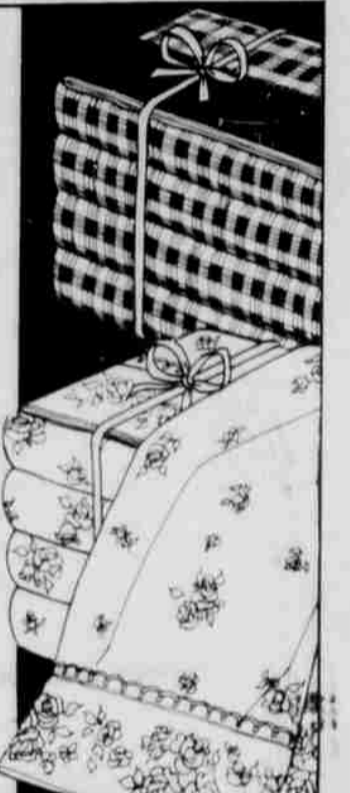
