

Students visit OMSI

What's an OMSI? Ask any 7th grader at Heppner Elementary School and he will tell you that an OMSI is the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry located next to the Portland Zoo in the City of Roses.

The 7th graders are well acquainted with the museum since they went as a group on May 1 to see what it had to offer. And, according to student reporters Randy Worden and Michelle Cutsforth, the OMSI had a lot of things to see and do.

One of the main points of the group's tour was a series of talks and demonstrations of electricity and electronic principles. The talks centered on properties of electricity and several myths concerning the dangers of it were explained to students.

Another high point was the show in the planetarium. OMSI's famous transparent lady was an exhibit enjoyed by

students. The body shows all the muscular and nervous systems in life-like detail. Also a large open heart was walked into to study some of its interesting parts.

Before leaving the museum the students went into an animal room which featured incubators where they were able to study the birth and life of many domestic animals. A large DC-3 plane was examined closely by the students, which included peering into the exposed motors where the internal parts could be seen and explained.

No trip to OMSI would be complete without a tour of the neighboring zoo, and the students spent the rest of their Portland visit taking the wonders of the animal world.

Accompanying the students were their teachers, Inez Meador and Eddie Sherman, and chaperones Helen Keithley and Vic Groshens.

According to science teacher Inez Meador, exhibits will include students' individual projects as well as the group project which the science class has worked on throughout the year.

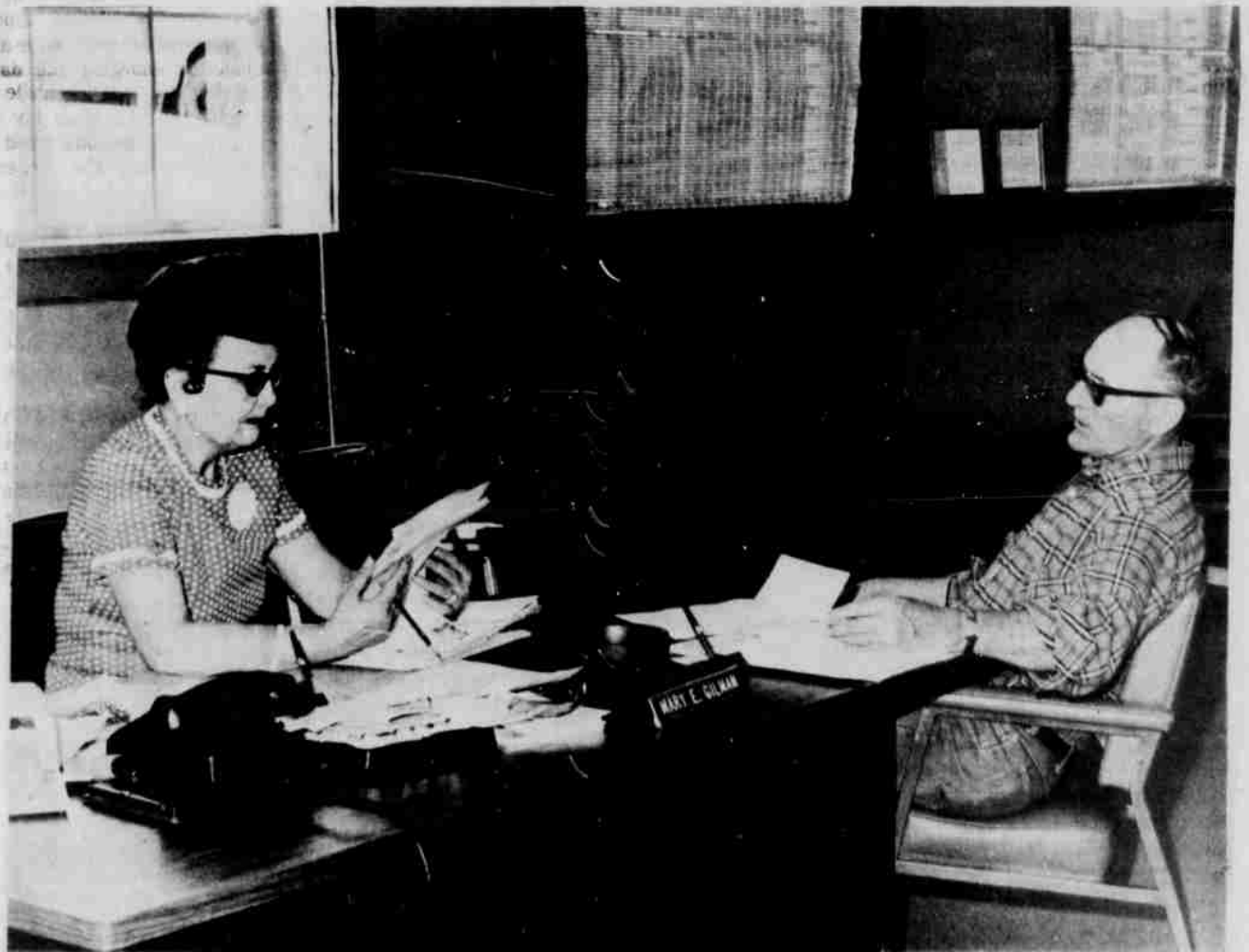
The fair, held every other year, will be Mrs. Meador's last. Next year she will teach 4th grade.
