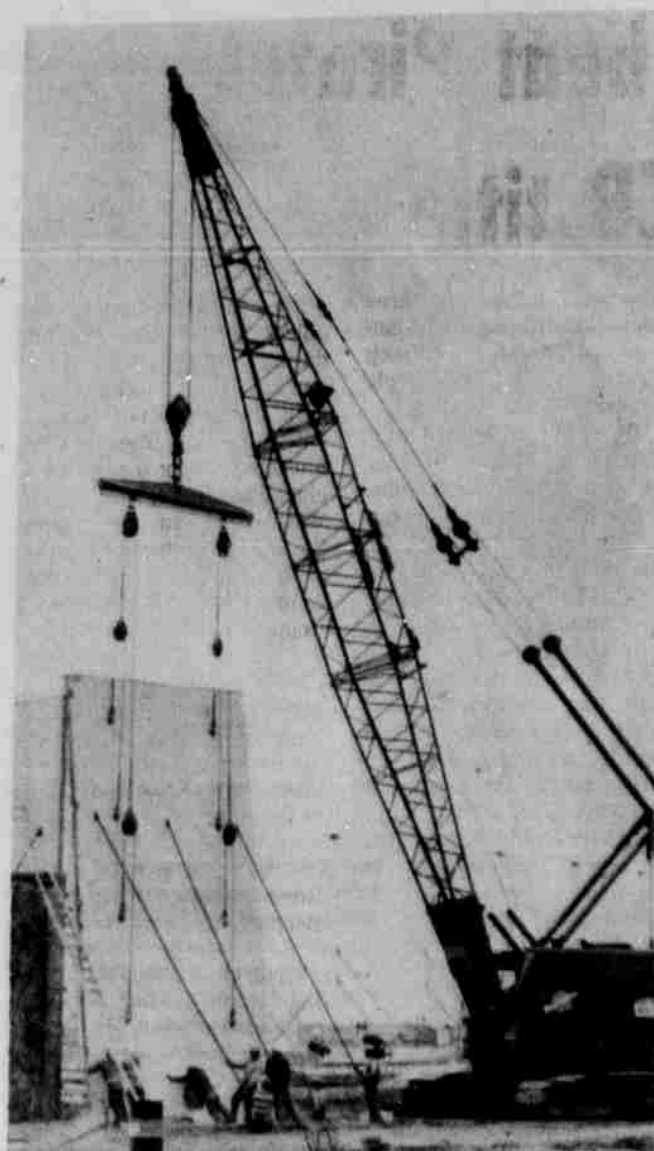
Graduation exercises will be held May 24 for the Riverside class of 1974.
