

Mustangs beat Pirates to clinch CB title

The Heppner Mustangs clinched the western division of the Columbia Basin Conference when they galloped off with a pair of victories from the Riverside Pirates Friday at Boardman.

The first was a makeup game from earlier in the season, and the Heppner squad easily romped away with a 14-6 win over the Boardman nine.

Gentry was on the mound for Heppner and fanned 10 batters in winning.

At the plate the Mustangs banged the ball all over the diamond, but were unable to get past first base at their 14 hits were all singles.

Leading the way of this one-base attack were Karl Harrison and John Kilkenny

who each picked up three while Cliff Harris, Dyck Dunlap and Steve Peck each stroked a pair of the single baggers.

The Pirates swatted four hits and preyed on Heppner errors to gather their six runs.

The Mustangs added insult to injury by coming back for the next game and took it 15-1.

John Boyer claimed game honors as he mowed down the Pirates to allow only one run and struck out 11 Pirates. He was equally efficient at the plate as he cracked a triple and two doubles.

The game was clearly in possession of the Mustangs as they scattered 17 hits and feasted on 9 Boardman errors to make the tilt rather one-sided.

Cards beat the Huskies, 6-4

The lone Cardinals showed the league they are still dangerous as they downed the 2nd place Sherman Co. Huskies at Lone Friday, 6-4.

The Cards jumped off to a comfortable lead in the third inning when they totaled three runs to go ahead 4-1. The Huskies came back with power at the plate and evened it up in the top of the fourth as they added three of their own before Card pitcher Kevin Gutierrez could stop them.

Two more Cardinal runs in the bottom of the fourth and two innings of shutout ball by Gutierrez saved the game for lone.

The win left the Cards nestled in the middle of the league standings, as they have bounced from top to bottom throughout the season. Although the Cards have been inconsistent in winning they have showed good strength

this year in beating the top three teams, Wasco Co., Sherman Co. and Heppner, to claim at least one victory over each of them.

On the darker side, they lost some heartbreakers to some of the lower echelon league teams by embarrassing scores.

The Cardinals of lone beat every team in the league, and lost to every team in the league, to make a 1-1 record against all their foes.

Over all, the Cards finished the season with a 5-5 league record and were 8-6 on the season.
