Martins end tour of Turkey, Greece

Mr. and Mrs. Fredrick Martin, Ione, returned May 10 from a vacation that included a 12-day tour of Turkey, two days in Athens, Greece, and a five day visit with friends in Walpole, Mass.

The Martins left New York City April 18 and arrived in Istanbul the following day after a brief stopover in Zurich, Switzerland.

Their tour, called "History at its Best," was a group of 16 people sponsored by the United Church of Christ for the purpose of visiting the UCC projects in Turkey; seeing many of the ancient ruins of biblical significance; and visiting churches and modern 20th century cities. The group leader, Mrs. Robert Midgley, and the chaplain, Rev. Robert Midgley, are presently serving on the United Church Board for World Ministries, Near-East committee. The group's resource leader, Rev. Everett Blake, had spent 40 years living in Turkey, serving the various mission schools.

UCC projects in Turkey include schools, missions, clinics and hospitals. Among those visited were Uskidar girl's school, Istanbul; Talas Nute Clinic, Talas; Tarsas American College, Tarsas; Azariah Smith Memorial Hospital and Nursing school, Gaziantep; and the American Collegiate Institute, Izmir.

The Martins had visited a home in a small village and had tea on the flat rooftop. They found the people of Turkey friendly, especially young children who were anxious to converse in English since it is taught in all the schools. The men and children were eager to have their pictures taken. But the women, who still observe the tradition of covering their faces, would turn their backs on the cameras.

The Martins reported that "Turkey is a beautiful, fascinating country, full of history of civilizations down through the ages. And it is a country of contrasts, from ancient ruins to traditional rural villages, to large western cities with skyscrapers and the latest fashions."

The tour continued to Athens, then to New York City, where the tour ended.

Back in the U.S., the Martins went to Walpole, near Boston, and visited the Captain Roy Belcher family. The home, which has been in the

Belcher family for generations, was a 12-room colonial built in 1770 and furnished with heirlooms and antiques. The Martins visited historical sights in the Boston area. After a 24-day absence, the Martins returned home and have been busy sorting and labeling more than 1000 pictures taken on the trip.
