

## Ione pool open on June 2

Ione School's swimming pool director, Maureen McElligott, has announced that summer pool operation will begin Sunday, June 2, at 2 p.m.

The pool will be open for free swimming on opening day.

Pool hours are as follows: Closed on Mondays, and open Tuesday through Sunday from 2 to 5 and from 7 to 9 p.m.

Daily admission charges are: adults, 50 cents; grades 7-12, 25 cents; grades 1-6, 15 cents; and pre-school, free.

Season passes are: families, \$20; adults, \$10; grades 7-12, \$6; grades 1-6 \$4; and pre-school, free. Rental after regular hours will be \$10.

Due to recent damage to one of the underwater lights, the pool opening may be delayed. Notices will be posted at Bristow's and at the school office if delay is necessary.

The schedule for swimming and life saving lessons will be announced at a later time.

### Notice of Special Levy Election

Notice is hereby given that at the Boardman Rural Fire Protection District special election hereby called to be held on Tuesday, the 18th day of June, 1974, between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. Pacific Daylight Time, in and for the Boardman Rural Fire Protection District, there will be submitted to the qualified voters thereof the question of authorizing a serial tax levy for the Boardman Rural Fire Protection District in the sum of \$6,000.00 annually pursuant to Section 11, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution, to be effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1974, and continue for 10 consecutive years. The votes shall be by ballot in substantially the following form:

#### QUESTION SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE BOARDMAN RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Measure No. 1: Shall the Board of Directors of the Boardman Rural Fire Protection District be authorized to make a serial tax levy in the amount of \$6,000.00 for the fiscal year 1974-1975 for the purposes of purchasing equipment and operational costs.

These proposed taxes are outside and in addition to the limitation imposed by Section 11 of Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

The maximum rate of levy deemed necessary to raise Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) is the sum Ninety Cents Per Thousand (90c per \$1,000.00) of true cash value of taxable property within the district, to run for ten consecutive years.

The voter shall place an (X) or (✓) before the words "Yes, I vote for the serial levy" or before the words "No, I vote against the serial levy" to signify choice.

( ) Yes, I vote for the serial levy.

( ) No, I vote against the serial levy.

The election is to be held at the Carroll Donovan residence. The polls shall be open at the hour of 8:00 A.M. and remain open until the hour of 8:00 P.M. of the same day, at which time the polls will be closed.
