Heppner High School sent five varsity golfers to a district golf match at Madras, May 12.

To qualify for the state golf meet players had to place first or second at the Madras competition.

Although Heppner did not send a golfer to state, it did do well as a team, beating the other A schools at the meet and finishing 5th. Burns took first, followed by Prineville, Madras, John Day and Heppner.

Tops for the Heppner squad was Gary Hunt who shot a good 84, but was still several strokes from qualifying for state. Doug Gunderson came through with an 87; Mike Mills, 89; Barry Munkers, 91; and Charlie Rawlins, 106.

Top shooter at the meet was Allen Stevens from Umatilla who toured the course in 79. Coach Tom Shear admitted

the competition at the meet was "much tougher than we expected," but was pleased with the overall performance of the team.

The Heppner girls golf squad did not compete at the state meet due to schedule problems. The girls teams do not have a district meet, just one large state competition every season.

The squad finished at the top of the District 7-A schools and dashed their way to a 9th place finish among the 69 schools at the state meet. They sent a total of 11 members to the state meet in Pleasant Hill, where the 440 relay team of John Boyer, Matt Greenup, Mike Bergstrom and Karl Harrison took championship honors.

As a team the tracksters won all local invitational meets except one at Condon, where they placed second.

Awards for outstanding members in each class were given to Carl Christman, freshman; Wade Padberg, sophomore; David McLeod, junior; and Mike Bergstrom, senior. Bergstrom was also chosen for the All-Around award of 1974 track. Heppner track members listed in Who's Who in Prep Track were Karl

Harrison, John Boyer, Mike Bergstrom, Dave McLeod and Wade Padberg.

Randall Peterson gave the state champion 440 relay team the engraved baton they used this season. Peterson made the presentation on behalf of track supporters in the area.

After the team presentations were made, Heppner High School Athletic Director Naffziger gave several special awards to local people involved in sports.

He gave special recognition to Doug Gunderson, a graduating senior, for his hours of work given to the sports programs at the high school. Doug had kept scorebooks, notebooks of statistics and manned the scoreboard through his four years of school. Naffziger noted that without people of Doug's caliber the sports programs at the school would not be as successful as they are now.

Dr. L.D. Tibbles was honored for his 39 years of aid he has given the high school sports programs. Naffziger noted that Dr. Tibbles had often been called in the middle of the night to help athletes, and was always present at home events to support the team both as a fan and as a physician.

Boyer, who has been a top athlete in all four sports during his years "on the hill," was given further honors when Naffziger announced he had been listed as a top athlete in Who's Who in National High School Sports Activities and in Coach and Athlete Magazine.

Before the evening ended, Clint Agee was honored by the crowd for his work in past years in sports programs at the grade school. This was Agee's last year at the school. It was noted that the sports program in Heppner will always be strong as long as there is a good grade school program to reinforce the high school programs.

Student arrested

John Armistead Weller, 20, a student at Oregon State University, was arrested May 25 by State Police on two counts of possession of drugs—marijuana and amphetamines.

Weller was lodged in Morrow County jail May 28 in lieu of \$5,005 bail. Oregon law requires that a person accused of crime be arraigned within three days of his arrest. Tuesday, election day, was a non-judicial day. But Weller was brought before Justice of the Peace Charles O'Connor at Lone Tuesday.

O'Connor heard Weller's plea of not guilty, reduced bail to \$1,600, then released Weller on his own recognizance so that he might take his examinations at the university.

The Blue Mountain Community College board has told President Wallace McCrae to prepare a plan for zoning the college district to give more equal board representation to all segments of the district.

Zoning has never been required because all areas of the two-county district have been represented on the board. With the retirement of Bob Abrams, Heppner, from the board next month, Morrow County will be without a representative on the board. Abrams' post will be filled

by James Whitney, Pendleton. He defeated Dorothy Krebs Ione and Irvin Rauch, Lexington, in the May 7 election. Also new to the board in July will be Malachi Campbell Hermiston, replacing retiring Russell Dorran, also of Hermiston. Both Dorran and Abrams have served on the board since the college was formed in 1962.

McCrae suggested that a zoning plan be drawn up and that consideration be given to circulating a petition to get the issue on the ballot for a district vote.
