A federal loan of \$1.5 million for the Port of Morrow has been approved under the Rural Development Act by the Farmers Home Administration, Cong. Al Ullman announced Friday.

Ullman said the loan fund is earmarked to build sanitary sewage and industrial waste disposal facilities, along with new water supply piping and equipment.

According to Port plans, water and industrial waste from potato processing plants will be treated and then used to supplement Columbia River water used in irrigating farmland owned and leased out by the Port of Morrow.

The treatment facilities are to be constructed for the Port of Morrow Industrial Park. Repayment period for the loan is 30 years at 5 per cent interest.
