Reference books come from BMCC

Librarian Mary Bates of Blue Mountain Community College told the Heppner Public Library that it is welcome to some of the reference books that are being replaced at the college.

Several weeks ago Mrs. Weatherford brought three useful publications here from BMCC. They are now available for patrons in the library's general reference shelves. They are:

"The World of Learning," published by Europa Publications, Limited, London, 1967; a large volume listing all institutions of higher education throughout the world.

"World Statistical Yearbook," published by the United Nations, 1973 (1972 Edition) which gives statistics in both English and French on the population, manpower, industries, communications, consumption, finances, cultural growth and other areas of interest for all nations.

"Ayer Directory of Publications," 104th annual edition, 1972, which lists all print media published in the United States and its territories; in the Dominion of Canada, Bermuda, The Republic of Panama and the Philippines; with descriptions of the states, provinces, cities and towns where they are published; with 18 separate classified listings and 70 maps.

Last Saturday Bob Abrams and his son Rob brought the eight over-sized volumes of the "Thomas Register" from Pendleton to the local library.

This work is the 58th edition published by the Thomas Publishing Company, N.Y., 1968. Seven of the volumes list all the manufacturers of America, telling about the businesses and giving their owners. The eighth volume is a product-finding guide that is indexed so that one can locate the manufacturer of each

product in the seven main volumes. It is believed that this is the first time Morrow County has had a "Thomas Register" within its borders.

Mrs. Bates explained that these reference works have just been replaced by newer editions by the BMCC Library. She felt that because Morrow County is a partner in the community college that the library here should have these deleted volumes if it was felt they would be used.

Along with the large non-fiction catalog that State Librarian Eloise Ebert brought here last week, these publications from BMCC have raised the status of the reference offerings of the Heppner library considerably.

If library usage continues to increase here, it is probable that more non-fiction as well as fiction will be added to the collection. Besides these non-fiction contributions and its own 1974 purchases of new books, several local individuals and families have recently given the library books from their holdings which enhance the collection.

Alcoholism committee meets here

The Morrow County Alcohol and Drug Committee met at the Mental Health Clinic June 11, with thirteen people present, including three members of the Oregon Alcoholism and Health Association in Portland.

The extent of the problem of alcohol in the community and county was discussed. Recommendations regarding prevention, education and rehabilitation programs in Morrow County were made.

The lack of appropriate facilities for housing alcoholics and detoxifying them was explored in depth.

The Oregon Alcoholism and Health Association is wanting to start a local alcohol council to coordinate alcohol programs in the local areas. Morrow County is one of only five counties in Oregon not currently affiliated with the OAHA.

The use of volunteers was explored with the suggestion on the part of the OAHA representatives that some money might be made available for local volunteers who want to participate in special training programs to learn how to work with problem drinkers in any local facility

that might be developed. A discussion of the need for safety programs related to alcohol in local industry was held.

A film, "Ninety Nine Bottles of Beer," was shown to demonstrate the type of educational films available. The local committee is exploring the idea of creating a special school for DUI cases and MIP cases such as those programs currently existing in Pendleton and LaGrande.

The chairman of the committee is Pastor Mark Johnson. New membership in this committee is welcome. The next meeting of the committee will be announced in the Gazette-Times.
