

# Indians beat Giants, 7-6

## Courses offered at pool

A water safety instructor course will be offered at Heppner Municipal Pool if enough public interest is shown.

## Flood Insurance Available in Heppner

Federally-subsidized flood insurance is available in the Heppner Flood Plain effective June 21, for dwellings and commercial buildings.

Coverage is immediate.

Premium rates are available up to \$35,000 for single-family dwellings and up to \$100,000 on multi-family and non-residential properties; and up to \$10,000 per unit on residential contents and \$100,000 on non-residential property.

All buildings located within the special flood hazard areas must be covered by flood insurance after March 1, 1974.

During the first 30 days (to July 21, 1974) coverage is effective immediately. After the first 30 days there is a 15-day waiting period after application before coverage takes effect.

Failure to obtain flood insurance will result in your being unable to obtain bank or savings and loan company loans for mortgages or repairs. Also, no loans will be available from any federal agency.

Policies for flood insurance may be obtained from any of the licensed property insurance agents listed below.

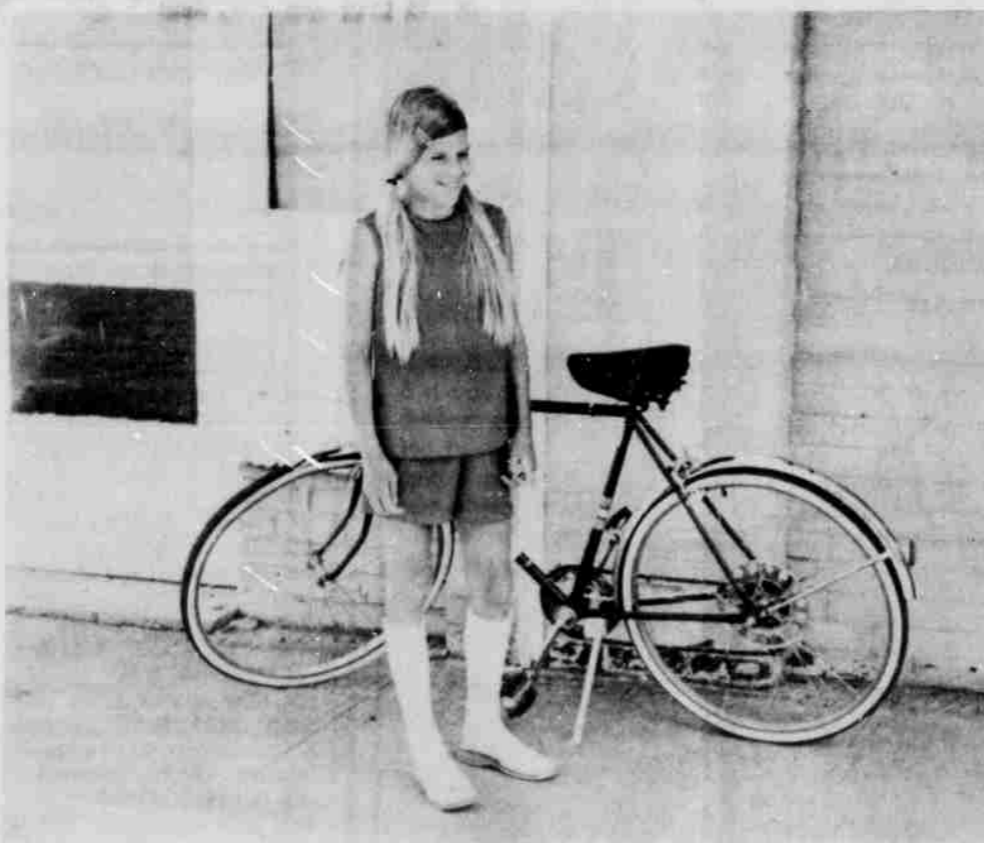
