Eau de manure, with just a hint of mint

The scent of mint may someday perfume air surrounding feedlots and other concentrated livestock production areas that produce offensive odors.

Incorporating mint into livestock rations to see if odors can be altered is just one of several phases of odor control research being initiated by Oregon State University agricultural engineer Ron Miner, whose research specialty is animal waste management.

Research shows that odors associated with livestock production are related primarily to manure management.

Miner has been working on manure management problems with support from an Environmental Protection Agency grant since February 1973. His main concern has been efficient waste removal and disposal systems that reduce potential soil and water pollution hazards by controlling infiltration and surface runoff.

His most recent development has been the design and successful testing of a liquid-solid separator that greatly reduces the volume of wastes produced by removing solids from manure and recycling the water, which is the bulk of the waste. The concept has its most practical application in dairies where water is used to flush manure from barn floors.

A \$49,500 extension of the original EPA grant which will run until December 1975 is stressing a new direction for the research—that of odor control and particularly the impact air-borne gases from animal wastes have on nearby water supplies.

"Odor is a very subjective phenomenon," said Miner. "Much of our response is determined by our previous experience or by our frame of mind at the time the odor is encountered."

A study by OSU microbiologists who have improved techniques for measuring air-borne gases, Miner hopes to

determine how much ammonia is released into the air, how and how far it travels in the air, and how much of it is absorbed by nearby bodies of water.

"Ammonia is a potential water pollutant and not the source of offensive odors in manure, but it could be an indicator to determine presence and quantity of odor-causing compounds," said Miner.

Miner also will be determining how various feed rations influence odor production. Included will be the mint-incorporated ration as well as rations containing sagebrush, which has been reported to change the odor of manure.

Whether the new or altered odors will be acceptable, remains to be seen.

"People tend to smell what they anticipate, and odors associated with livestock production might remain offensive, even though the same odors may be pleasing in another context," said Miner.
