Lovgren reunion July 4

The annual Lovgren family picnic was held July 4 at Anson Wright Park with 60 members present.

Alton A. Johnson of Coos Bay has compiled a genealogy of the Lovgren family that traces the family name back to the 18th century in Sweden.

Andres Petter Lovgren (known in America as Andrew Peter Lovgren) was born in Sweden in 1824 and arrived in America in 1870. He and his family came to Morrow County in 1889, settling at a post office known as Davidson, later known as Gooseberry. The family became members of the Valtby Lutheran Church. Andrew Lovgren died at Eightmile, Sept. 7, 1896.

The first known Lovgren in Sweden, according to Johnson's genealogy, was a merchant's son from Danzig, Germany, who became mayor of Vasteras, Sweden, and died there in 1588.
