Three workshops on food preservation techniques

Those who attend one of a series of Extension sponsored "Food for Later" workshops will have the opportunity to get food preservation questions answered.

Programs are scheduled for Baker, July 16; La Grande, July 17; Pendleton, July 18; and Heppner, July 24.

OSU Extension home economists Dorothy Lundbom, Baker; Pat Phillips, Union; and Molly Saul, Morrow-Umatilla counties, will join forces to give demonstrations and discuss the many ways to preserve food for later use. Bulletins and instruction sheets will be distributed.

The program is set for 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Persons may attend the entire day or just the portion of special interest to them. The schedule is as follows:

9 a.m., canning—use of water bath and pressure canner and cost comparisons; 10 a.m., jams and jellies—cooked and uncooked; 11 a.m., pickle making, including

sauerkraut; 1 p.m., freezing—fruits, vegetables, meats, fish, poultry and cost comparisons; 1:30 p.m., drying foods; 2 p.m., general questions and answers on food preservation.

At the Pendleton workshop Mrs. Leo Klaus, Hermiston, will give the demonstration on smoking fish and poultry. There will be samples. Mrs. Klaus has made a hobby of smoking trout and poultry with a small, inexpensive
