

Training plan for hospital staffers

The color-video cassette playback units recently purchased by the Oregon Lung Association for use in the Eastern region are being circulated to hospitals in this region for professional education purposes.

Physicians, nurses, hospital personnel and in some cases, patients, are taking advantage of the opportunity to review presentations on such subjects as management of tuberculosis, covering diagnosis, chemotherapy, and transmission of the TB bacilli; emphysema, spirometry, early detection of COPD; and the secrets of breathing.

The playback units and the

cassettes have already made the circuit in Pendleton's three hospitals, St. Elizabeth Community Hospital, Baker, Pioneer Memorial Hospital, Heppner, Grande Ronde, La Grande, Wallowa Memorial Hospital, Enterprise, and the Blue Mountain Hospital, John Day. It is also planned that the hospitals in Hermiston and Ontario will be able to receive week-long benefits of the cassettes and equipment during July.

The Northwest Oregon Medical Planning Committee has recently received approval of its request for \$8,000,000 from the Oregon Regional Program Funds to enhance professional education for physicians, nurses and hospital personnel in Eastern Oregon. A coordinator will soon be hired to work with the hospitals' medical staff. This pioneering program to provide continuous medical education could be a milestone in improving the total medical delivery system in Eastern Oregon.

Hospital levy is approved

Morrow County voters approved a \$56,573 serial levy Tuesday that will insure continued operation of Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

The vote was 710 for and 140 against the levy.

A similar levy of \$65,000 for the hospital's operation was rejected by voters in the May primary election.

Irrigon was the only precinct in Morrow County to reject Tuesday's levy, 9 votes for, 42 against.
