"Read your fair book carefully before entering any exhibits."

That's the advice of Delpha Jones of the Morrow County Fair Committee. Fair book premium lists are still available at the post office and extension service. All exhibits must be in place by 11 a.m., Tuesday, Aug. 20.

Preparations are well underway for this year's fair. Barns and fences are being painted. There's an addition to the 4-H Snack Shack and renovation of another food stand over the grandstands.

Sunday, Aug. 18, has been designated as Work Day at the Morrow County Fairgrounds to clean up and make final preparations for the events.

Judging will begin Tuesday morning for 4-H knitting and crochet, and the Wednesday night Style Revue is "perking right along," according to Birdine Tullis of the extension service. 100 girls are expected to model clothes they have made during the year. A pre-Style Revue program will take up the theme, "Those Were The Days," in a quick look at the fashions of the past beginning with the 1890s through today's styles.

For the first time there will be a special 4-H awards program held Thursday at 4 p.m. All 4-H home economics and livestock awards will be given at that time.

In the flower department a new class, terrariums, has been added for judging.

Booth judging will begin Tuesday at 8 a.m. Judging begins on open class exhibits and 4-H and FFA livestock on Wednesday.

The Morrow County Fair is held primarily for the purpose of encouraging more profitable agriculture and home-making in the county. In distributing the premium money that is available, the committee has emphasized the products of most importance. In order to encourage more exhibits, no entry fees are charged.

In seeking to improve the county fair there are again some changes in the premium list. The board has added

classes and lots where expanding exhibits have called for them. The sweepstakes for wheat and hay and grass are again being offered, as well as sweepstakes for the best flower arrangement and best flower in the exhibit, the board announced.

Members of the Morrow County Fair Board are George Luciani, chairman, Zearl Gellispie, Jim Norene, Paul Hisler, Floyd Jones, Lenna Smith, secretary-treasurer, and Mrs. Hazel Bauman, general building superintendent. The County Fair Committee members are Helen Acock, chairman, Jean Bennett, Bev Doherty, Delpha Jones, Francine Evans, Pete Richards, Ron Black, Mike Howell, Merlin Cantin and Hal Whitaker.

"Despite the usual last minute problems, we're going to have a good fair. The people are going to pull together and this year's fair will be a success," said George Luciani, fair board chairman.

No open auction for fair animals

Livestock at the Morrow County Fair will be auctioned in the same as in previous years.

The decision was made Monday night at a joint meeting of the Fair Board, Fair Committee and Livestock Committee.

After long discussion, sometimes heated, those present voted that there would be no open auction of fair animals, as had been suggested by the Gazette-Times. A motion that the bid price for the champion establish the ceiling price for other auctioned animals was approved, 13-6. This means that the bid price for animals other than champion will be based on the market price on the day of the auction, plus a per pound limit that is as yet undecided.

Heppner Rodeo to be action-packed

The 1974 RCA-approved Heppner Rodeo starts at 1:15 p.m., Saturday, Aug. 24, and will feature national rodeo champions as well as outstanding local rodeo performers.

There will be an evening show Saturday beginning at 8 o'clock.

The final show begins at 1:15 p.m., Sunday. Prizes and cash totalling more than \$2,375 will be awarded.

The entertainment includes the Morrow County amateur calf roping, pony races, GRA girls' barrel racing, cowgirl races, Wrangler amateur cow riding, bull riding, novice bronc riding and Morrow County team roping events.

Purses for winners range from \$20 to \$300, plus special prizes and gift certificates.

Most events call for a \$20 entry fee, but fees range from \$25 for calf roping to a \$10 fee for the quarter-mile open race and bronc riding.

Rodeo entries for Morrow County events will open at 10 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 23.

The Rodeo Committee is composed of Don Evans,

chairman; Dennis Doherty, secretary; Arnie Hedman, director of dances; Orval Matheny, director of grounds; Bob VanSchoiack, director of barns; Joe Yocom, director of races; Pat O'Brien, director of queen and court; Jim Rogers, director of publicity; Jerry Dougherty, director of trophies and concessions; Rod Murray, director of livestock; and Ken Belcher, director of tickets and parking.

Heppner rodeos began in 1922 under the leadership of L.V. Gentry, C.W. McNamer and C.H. Latourell.
