Free meals for the elderly continue

Frank Hales, senior citizen planner for the East Central Oregon Association of Counties, will be asked to seek a supplemental nutrition grant from the state to keep the meal program for the aged going.

At the Dist. 12 (ECOAC) Area Agency on Aging Advisory Council meeting in Heppner Aug. 27, Rho Bleckman, Grant County, and John Canaday, Morrow County, were elected chairman and vice-chairman for the coming year.

In July the Oregon State Program on Aging appropriated \$43,000 to sustain Community Actions' senior citizen

meal programs in Grant, Morrow, Umatilla and Wheeler counties. Council members are concerned that the continuing high cost of food and greater citizen participation at the meals will exhaust funds already appropriated. The funds requested from the state agency is expected to cover meal costs for a year.

More than 1,000 elderly people are expected to attend the meal program each week in October. Regardless of the budget, the council invited all senior citizens in the district, regardless of income, to visit the meal and recreational sites. Transportation can be provided for those needing it.

John Nielson returns from Copenhagen

John Nielson of Heppner recently made a trip to Copenhagen, Denmark.

He left Seattle-Tacoma International Airport on July 1 and returned to Heppner Aug. 21. While there he visited with a brother and joined in the celebration of his sister's 80th birthday.

Speaking of Copenhagen, Nielson was struck with the high rate of inflation. "It's even higher than here in the United States," said Nielson. "People can't even afford to own a home."

Mr. Nielson has been a resident of Heppner since 1922 and retired from the highway department since 1969.

He speaks fluent Danish and has no trouble adjusting to the language during his visit.

Asked if he had considered staying in Denmark to be with his family, Nielson said "Heppner is my home, and it's good to be back."

200 examined at clinics

Almost 200 pre-school and pre-high school students were given complete health checks at the Multiphasic Health Clinic sponsored by Morrow Extension Service, state and county health personnel last week.

Two clinics were held to accommodate the large number of students wishing to take advantage of the free clinics. 96 students were examined in the Irrigon clinic, 85 at Heppner. Schools in both areas participated by allowing use of the elementary buildings for the testing. The

complete physical examination included growth, vision, laboratory, hearing, developmental, nutritional evaluation, immunizations, doctor's examination, and a final conference evaluation. In the final conference evaluation, parents were informed of any unusual findings of the screening, and referred to their local doctor.
