Citizen study committees being formed by AAUW

Citizen study committees are now being organized by the Heppner Branch of the Associated University Women.

The committees are small county action, the committee to sponsor cultural activities locally, library action, crafts, Neighborhood Center and the study of countries through foods.

Two other committees will form later in the year. The committee to develop a roster of qualified women for Morrow County will be headed by Liz Curtis. This committee will develop a list of Morrow County women qualified to serve on various committees and boards in the county. This committee will form sometime after the first of the year. In the spring the Girls' Slow

Pitch program will be continued under the direction of Martha Doherty. This program, highly successful this past year, will require a great deal of volunteer help. These committees are being formed for citizens of the county, and not just for the membership.
