

Adult classes begin

The Adult General Education class offered by Blue Mountain Community College will resume this evening, Sept. 26, 7:30 p.m., and next Wednesday, Oct. 2, 9 p.m., at the Neighborhood Center, Heppner.

Through this class adults who have not completed high school may work toward earning their GED or Adult High School Diploma.

The GED is a certificate of high school equivalency. To earn it a person must be at least 16 and successfully complete five tests: English, literature, social studies, science and math. Through the Adult General Education class, adults study to successfully complete the tests. Testors from the college come to Heppner to administer the tests to students.

The next step educationally is a new program, the Adult High School Completion Program. To earn it a person must be at least 18, and must be able to meet the minimum state requirements set for high school graduation. Many adults who have completed most of their junior year in high school find themselves just two or three courses away from their high school diploma awarded by the college.

Success has been the key word for the program here, as many adults have accomplished their educational goals. Costs are based on the individual's ability to pay, with \$5 per course as the maximum. Since courses are individualized, it doesn't matter when students start or whether they attend the Wednesday morning or Thursday evening class, or both.

paying bookkeepers \$500 per month.

In a detailed Requirements by Funds submitted by the hospital two months ago showing the proposed increases needed by the hospital, and compared with the monthly figures submitted Wednesday, discrepancies appear.

The salary of the administrator was set at \$11,093 per year or \$924.42 per month, yet Mrs. Wyman shows her salary to be \$932.88 per month or \$11,194.56 per year, an increase of \$101.56 per year.

The proposed wages for the hospital plant operation was set at \$28,970 per year for three men. However, the total wages paid these same three men in July was \$2,281.52, or when figured on a yearly basis, amounts to only \$26,622.24 for a difference of \$2,347.76 per year.

The housekeeping help was figured at two full-time and one part-time helper for a total of \$17,123 per year for all the women, yet the salaries of three women working a total of 388 hours amounted to \$838.61 or a total of \$10,063.32 for the year—a difference of \$7,059.68 for the year.

A total of \$6,054 was budgeted for a laundress and helper, part-time, and the two women earned a total of \$568.10 per month, or \$6,817.20 per annum.

At the time the proposed budget was submitted the hospital employed 12 nurses aides and two aides working part-time for a budget item of \$65,396 per year. The records show that 16 nurses aides were employed until four of them quit, but their positions are to be filled. The difference in the detailed requirement and the actual pay amounts to \$1,668.04 per year over the budgeted item.

The above figures are for the month of July, and in fairness to the hospital administration some of the employees may have been on vacation or worked overtime to make up for differences between the budgeted items and actual cost expenditures.

Boardman project gets PC approval

The Morrow County Planning Commission approved an application by the City of Boardman for construction of a sewer lagoon and irrigation system at its meeting Monday night.

Jim Thompson represented the City of Boardman and described the nature of the project. A total of 77 acres would be used for the system; 10 acres of actual lagoon with 67 acres of irrigated land, planted in alfalfa, to offset the cost of the sewage treatment

operation. The sewage treatment lagoon has been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency and other independent engineering firms retained by the City of Boardman.

The EPA has funded \$725,000 for the system. Total cost of the project is expected to reach \$1,200,000.

There was initial concern by the Port of Morrow over possible contamination of water supplies—the site is 1/2-mile east from the eastern

border of the Port of Morrow Food Processing Park—but with the assurances of the City of Boardman that the lagoon will be properly sealed, the Port of Morrow has withdrawn its objection.

Thompson explained that the sewage treatment system is needed to handle the increase in Boardman's population. Without the new facility, Thompson said, "The city will stink from one end to the other."

The commission also amended the zoning ordinance to combine farming and exclusive farm zones into the general category of qualified farm zone. The change updates the county zoning ordinance to meet state requirements. All farm land will now be assessed solely on the value of the farm rather than on "its highest and best use."
