The Make It Yourself With Wool Contest will be held at Blue Mountain College Theatre at 9 a.m., Nov. 9.

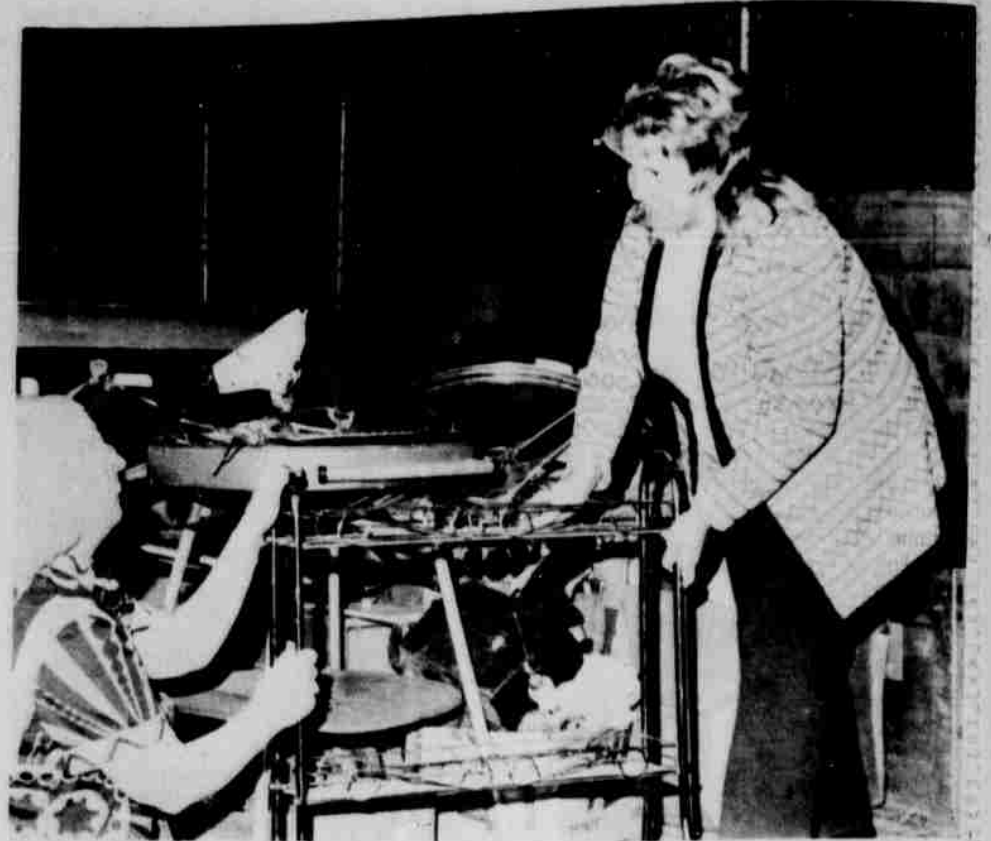

Day Care Center 'in business'

Tuesday, Oct. 1, marked the opening day of the Heppner Child Development Center.

The non-profit center offers day care services for children 10 years of age and younger. Activities provide opportunity for children to learn to get along and share with other children. Educational toys are provided for the children's play. After school programs for older children are available.

The center, located in facilities donated for public use by the Seventh-day Adventist Church, is open Monday through Friday, 6:30 a.m. to 6:15 p.m. Children arriving prior to 7 a.m. will be served breakfast. Lunch will be served at 11:30 a.m., and morning and afternoon snacks are also provided.

Federal funds are available under the 4-C (Community Coordinated Child Care) program for families where both parents are working or for

single parent families in which the single parent is working. The rate is a sliding fee depending on family income. The daily charge will never exceed \$4 for the first child, \$2 for each additional child of the same family. Occasional drop-in rates are available.

The center is certified by the state and federal governments and must meet all their regulations to provide a clean and reputable center. The center is certified for a maximum of 30 children.
