The lone Cardinals defeated Wheeler County, 38-6, Friday at lone in a Big Sky Conference game.

The Cardinals wasted no time in getting on the scoreboard in the first quarter, after Wheeler failed to move the ball on their first series of downs and went into punt formation. A surge by the Cardinals resulted in a blocked punt, with the Cardinals taking over the ball deep in Wheeler territory.

Paul Peterson took a hand-off and went into the end zone for the first score for the Cards, and the two point

conversion was good. Moments later the Cards again gave the ball to Peterson who went into the end zone for another TD. This time the conversion failed and as the gun sounded ending the first quarter the Cardinals had a 14-0 lead over Wheeler.

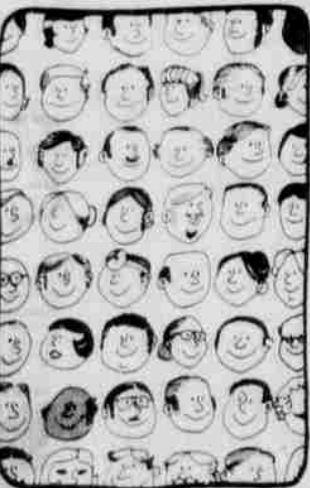

Sherman County scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second and three times in the third quarter; the Pirates scored their lone TD in the fourth quarter.

Mustangs drub Weston 26-14

The Heppner Mustangs defeated the Weston-McEwen Tiger Scots, 26-14, Friday at Athena, in league play in the Columbia Basin League.

The Tiger Scots scored first in the first quarter on a 10 yard pass, Dick Beamer to Kelly Cahill, with Kelly Allen adding the extra point.

The Mustangs came back and on a 60 yard pass play, Jerry Gentry to Wade Padberg, and the Mustangs trailed 7-6, as the try for extra point failed. Minutes later in the first quarter the Mustangs scored again, this time on a 19 yard pass play, Ken Eckman to Dave McLeod. The try for the extra point failed again and the Mustangs led 12-7.

In the second quarter a 23 yard pass, Gentry to McLeod, gave the Mustangs another six points, and Gentry ran the ball for an additional two points, as the Mustangs increased their lead, 20-7.

Still in the second quarter, Gentry connected with Padberg for another pass, this one good for 35 yards and another Mustang TD. The try for extra point failed and the Mustangs led 26-7.

In the fourth quarter, the Tiger Scots scored their second TD of the ball game on a one yard run into the end zone by Kelly Allen, who also kicked the PAT.

The statistics for the game are: first downs Heppner 9, Weston-McEwen 11; net yards rushing, Heppner 99, Weston-McEwen 56; net yards passing, Heppner 203, Weston-McEwen 104 and penalties Heppner 75, Weston-McEwen 50.

Gentry completed 9x25 passes for 184 yards including three TDs. Travis Thomas and John Kilkenny each had one pass interception. Clay West and Jerry Gentry each recovered a fumble.

Today, Oct. 10, the Mustangs meet the Condon Blue Devils at Heppner, with game time 7 p.m.
