

lone in 48-34 win over Cascade Locks

The lone Cardinals won their third game in the Big Sky Conference League Thursday by defeating the Cascade Locks Pirates 48-34 on their home grounds.

The Cardinals got off to a 14 point lead in the first quarter when Mike Warren scored on a one yard run into the end zone. Joel Peterson caught a pass in the end zone for the extra two points and the Cards were on the board, 8-0. Later in the first period, Warren scored again, this time on a 25 yard pass play, Charlie McEligott to Warren. The PAT failed and the Cards led 14-0.

In the second quarter, the

Pirates scored a TD on a 20 yard pass play, Richard Irving to Mike Beard, with the Pirates adding two points for the PAT.

The Cardinals came back and scored twice in the second quarter, a pass from Joe Rietmann to Todd Peterson. Good for 6 yards, and a 58 yard run by Mike Warren. As the half ended the Cards led the Pirates 28-8.

Cascade Locks came back to score three times in the third quarter and close the gap as lone still lead 28-26. However, the Cardinals scored two more TDs with Warren carrying both times, one on a

68 yard run and again on a 12 yard run. Going into the fourth quarter the lone Cardinals led 40-26.

In the fourth quarter, both teams scored, with Paul Peterson scoring for the Cardinals on a 31 yard run.

Statistics for the game are: Net yards rushing, lone 366 yards, Pirates 271 yards; net yards passing, lone 115, Pirates 71, with the Cardinals completing 12x25 passes.

Friday the Cardinals travel to Arlington for their game, and the following week, Oct. 25, they will host Dufur, in their Homecoming game. Game time is 2 p.m.

Pirates lose to Vikings

The Riverside Pirates are still having a tough time this season. They lost to the Umatilla Vikings, 14-0, Thursday.

The Vikings scored once in the second quarter when Mike Brown passed to Tim Leader for five yards and a TD, and again in the third quarter when Tim Bailey ran 35 yards to score following a blocked Pirate punt.

The Pirates made more yards on penalties than on the ground during the game—105 yards. They netted a minus 23 yards in rushing and a minus 15 yards in their passing attack.

The Heppner Mustangs blanked the Condon Blue Devils, 34-0, in a Columbia Basin League game Thursday.

Wade Padberg scored the first Mustang TD with a 38 yard run and Gentry added the PAT to give the Mustangs a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

In the second period, Clay Wilson scampered for 20 yards and another Mustang tally, with Gentry again adding the extra point. Gentry handed the ball off to Padberg, who cleared the opposition and raced 58 yards to score. This time the try for the extra point failed, and the half ended the

Mustangs on the comfortable side of a 20-0 lead.

In the third quarter the Mustangs scored twice, once on a 14 yard run by Ken Eckman and the second on a 47 yard pass, Gentry to Kilkenny. Both PATs were by Gentry.

The Mustangs rushed for 273 yards while holding their opponents to 56 yards rushing. Heppner gained 97 yards in passing while the Blue Devils were held to only 56 yards. Gentry completed 3x8 passes for 97 yards and one TD.

This week the Mustangs travel to Pilot Rock and meet the Rockets at 8 p.m.

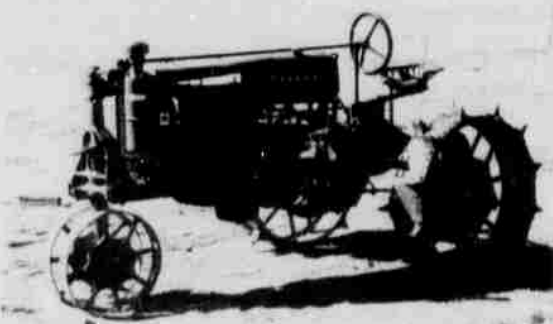
It is expected that the report will deal with enrollment projections, potential growth, and recommendations for housing the educational program in the future.

Following this report, the district board will hold its regular October meeting beginning at 8 p.m.

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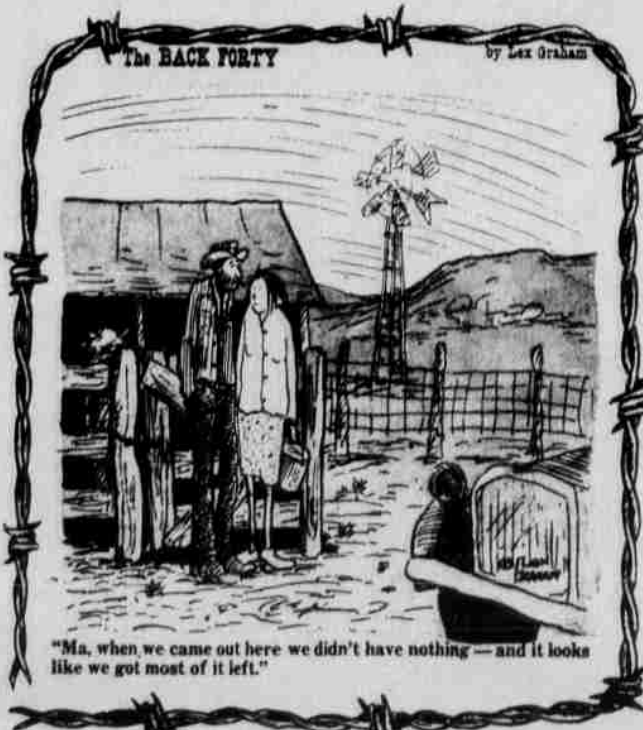
A Long Way in 50 years!
