Japan trip open to 4-H members

Plans are under way to take Oregon 4-H'ers to Japan as part of the Japan Labo-Oregon 4-H Teen Exchange program.

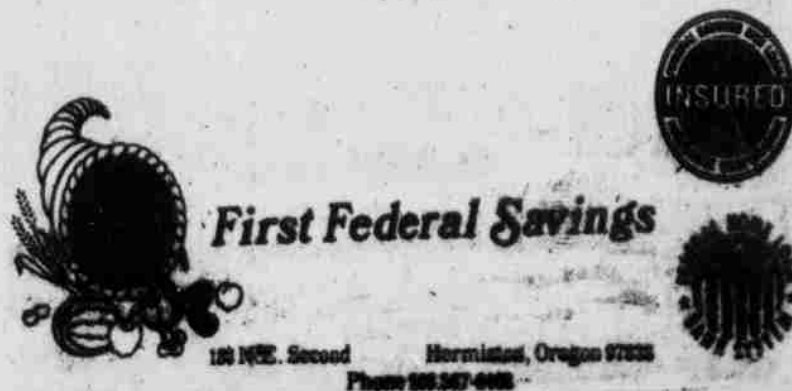
