Kinzua expects to open mill on schedule

Damaged boiler tubes which closed down Kinzua Corporation's lumber operation a couple of weeks ago are scheduled to be shipped from Pennsylvania on Oct. 29, according to a company spokesman, Paul Shiffer.

The 400 boiler tubes will leave the Pennsylvania shop on two trucks, he said, and should arrive in Heppner on Nov. 1 and 2. This puts the estimated time of repair and shipment ahead of schedule, and it may be possible to reopen the mill operation before the Nov. 18 date originally anticipated.

Olex marks 100th year

The ceremonies commemorating the establishment of the Olex post office drew a crowd of between 200 and 300 persons to the little Olex school Sunday afternoon.

Morrow folks interested in regional history joined residents of Gilliam, Wheeler and Umatilla counties and visitors from other Oregon and Washington locations for this early bi-centennial event.

Alumni of Olex School returned to enjoy the historic pageant featuring the present students. Some of the 1st through 8th graders rode their horses zig-zag down the steep hillside near the ceremonial site to "pony express" the first mail to a replica of the post office which opened Oct. 27, 1874. Other students square-danced. All the boys appeared dressed as earlyday baseball players in a tribute to the 1912 championship Olex

baseball team.

Judge James O. Burns, old-timers R.E. Irby, Lovena Palmer, Ned Norton and Lester Wilkins were speakers of the day. The Postal Sectional Center of Pendleton arranged the presentation of a special certificate to Clair Smyth, Olex postmistress. A commemorative plaque on the road below the Olex School was unveiled. Marion Weatherford, who was the master of ceremonies for the occasion, is also the bi-centennial chairman for Gilliam County.

A display of old pictures and early newspapers was viewed by many in the back classroom of the school. Members of the Olex Women's Club contributed and served refreshments in the school basement. The Arlington High School musicians played several patriotic selections.

Busy agenda for grange meeting
