PUBLIC NOTICE

The Umatilla Electric Cooperative Assn., 2135 N. 1st, Hermiston, Oregon, announces that it proposes to construct 15.4 miles of 115,000 volts transmission line with three phase 12.470 volts distribution underbuild. The 115,000 volts transmission line will replace an existing 69,000 volts transmission line, which can no longer supply the amount of power needed in the Irrigon-Boardman area.

This replacement will begin at a point approximately 4 1/2 miles East of Boardman, Oregon, in Morrow County. Starting at a point located in the S.W. corner, Section 8, T1N, R28 EWM and continuing in a northeasterly direction for 6.8 miles, through Sections 1, 2, 3, 8, 9, 10 TN 4N R26 EWM, through Section 36 TN 5N R26 EWM, and through Section 31 TN 5N R27 EWM.

At this point, the replacement line makes an angle and travels East 2 miles to the Morrow-Umatilla County Line and continues 2.8 miles. The line is located 29 feet South on a center line bordering the North section lines of Section 32, 33, 34, 36 TN 5N Range 27 EWM. At this point the line turns South for 2 miles through Section 36 TN 5N R27 EWM, and through Section 6, T1N R28 EWM, where the replacement line meets an existing 115,000 volts transmission line, located approximately 3 miles West of Hermiston, Oregon.

At the Morrow-Umatilla County Line, an existing 69,000 volt line goes North 1.8 miles to the Irrigon substation. This line will be reinsulated to 115,000 volts.

If there are any comments on the environmental aspects of the proposed construction, they should be submitted to the Cooperative within 30 days of the publication of this notice. Location maps of the proposed facilities may be seen at the Cooperative office in Hermiston.

Thailand bound

David J. Anderson, former Heppnerite and Harvey County Extension Agent since October, 1972, has resigned to accept a position as staff agronomist on a pineapple plantation in Thailand.

Effective Nov. 1, Anderson and his family will leave for Hua Hin, a summer resort area 140 miles south of Bangkok on the Gulf of Siam. He will supervise planting and field maintenance of Dole Thailand's 12,000-acre pineapple plantation owned by Castle & Cooke Foods.

Mr. and Mrs. Anderson recently returned from Thailand where they worked out final details of the assignment and secured housing and schooling for their two children.

Anderson is a 1965 graduate of Heppner High School and received his BS degree in crop science from Oregon State University in 1971. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Anderson. His father was Morrow County Extension Agent for 20 years. Anderson's wife, Barbara, is the daughter of Jim Bloodworth of Heppner.

Overseas assignments are not new for Anderson. He spent six months in French West Africa assisting his father in establishing a Young Farmers Training Center in Niger, and 13 months as a Peace Corps Volunteer Agricultural Advisor in Iran. He has also traveled extensively in 35 foreign countries.

As Harvey County Extension Agent, Anderson was in charge of educational programs in weed control and cereal grain production and was leader of the county 4-H youth program.
