RSVP workers are needed

June Wagner, director of the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), was in Heppner last week to enlist community support for the program designed to let persons over 60 fill necessary jobs here.

The Child Development Center needs volunteers to spend time with children, especially on a one-to-one basis. Pioneer Memorial Hospital needs people to make friendly visits

to patients; mending garments, reading, letter writing, conducting games and crafts. The Neighborhood Center needs office help, people to make quilts, engage in craft programs and help deliver hot meals. The Extension Service needs people to help 4-H Club leaders with projects in sewing, knitting, cooking and livestock.

The Morrow County Museum needs an attendant, and the Morrow County Mental Health Services need people to help in day treatment programs, work in the office and in crafts.

Any of these places would be glad to receive even one hour

a week in help from local volunteers. Although RSVP workers receive no pay for their work, they are paid 15 cents a mile for the use of their cars and are covered by accident insurance while working, or going to and from work.

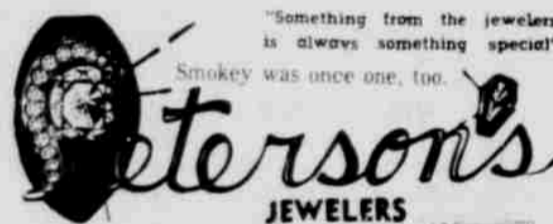
