

Winchesters visit eastern states

During most of October, Lois and Ernie Winchester were visiting the eastern states. They flew east and back in an American Airlines plane piloted by their son, Lowell L. Turner, who was given the passes for his parents' travel by his company.

Lowell, who received all of his public school education in Heppner, now lives with his wife Edith and daughters, Kim and Kisha, at Santa Rosa, Ca., where the Winchesters visited before and after their eastern trip.

Lowell was an U.S. Air Force pilot for five years, but withdrew to fly commercially. He first worked out of New York City, but as soon as his seniority would permit he transferred to the West Coast. He and his family enjoy their rural life near Santa Rosa, and Lowell commutes to San Francisco's airport to fly.

High spots of the trip included New England visits with Ernie's brother, Ben, and his family in Boston; with his sister, Bunny Mariano, and her family; and a reunion with his brother, Jack Winchester, whom he had not seen for 30 years.

Lois says, "We hit the jackpot for arriving at the most colorful and beautiful time of the year. Our trips around the Boston area and up through Maine and New Hampshire were enjoyable. The trip by cable car to the top of the White Mountains was very special. Everywhere the glorious fall colors were dazzling!"

For Lois, the 20th annual meeting of the Humane Society of the United States held at the Drake Oak Brook Motel, Chicago, was outstanding. She was impressed with the society president, a for-

mer clergyman, John Hoyt. She carefully wrote down some of his words, "I can envision no cause more important than that to which this organization has dedicated itself—the building of a society that respects the rights of all living creatures to an existence free from abuse, cruelty and ruthless exploitation."

Other outstanding persons attending the convention included Jack Valenti of the Motion Picture Association of America, Dr. Amy Freeman Lee, Roger Caras, and TV's Amanda Blake.

"Considerable progress has been made in the past year through presentations of facts and figures on surplus animal populations as a social problem affecting all citizens," Mrs. Winchester said. She quotes a full-page ad run in the Seattle Post-Intelli-

gencer on Sept. 11, 1974 in an effort to show the public the cruelty caused by thoughtless, ignorant persons who allow their pets to breed. The ad states, "Seattle's Animal Control Division had to destroy nearly 46,000 pets that their owners did not want. Each day two tons of destroyed pets were hauled to a rendering plant where they were made into meal to feed chickens and livestock."

She was pleased to learn that wild horse round-ups are being stopped, and that United Airlines now has 28 other major airlines joining them in refusing to ship animals in wooden slot crates. She declares "If the set of resolutions set up by the Humane Society of the U.S. at this convention are carried out, all animals will benefit—even animals in biomedical research."

SCHOOLS DAMAGED BY VANDALS

Vandals hit Heppner schools, presumably following the Homecoming football game Friday, tearing down goal posts at the field, scattering broken bottles around the parking area, and tearing up turf on the practice field.

At Heppner Elementary School a beer bottle was thrown through one of the large plate glass windows causing an estimated damage of \$200.

Paper was piled in the girls' cloakroom at the grade school and ignited. The fire damage was absorbed by the door, however, and there was only smoke and a scorched door as a result.

Thursday and Friday were in-service days for the teachers, and it is not known when the damage was done at the grade school, as it was discovered Monday morning when school resumed.
