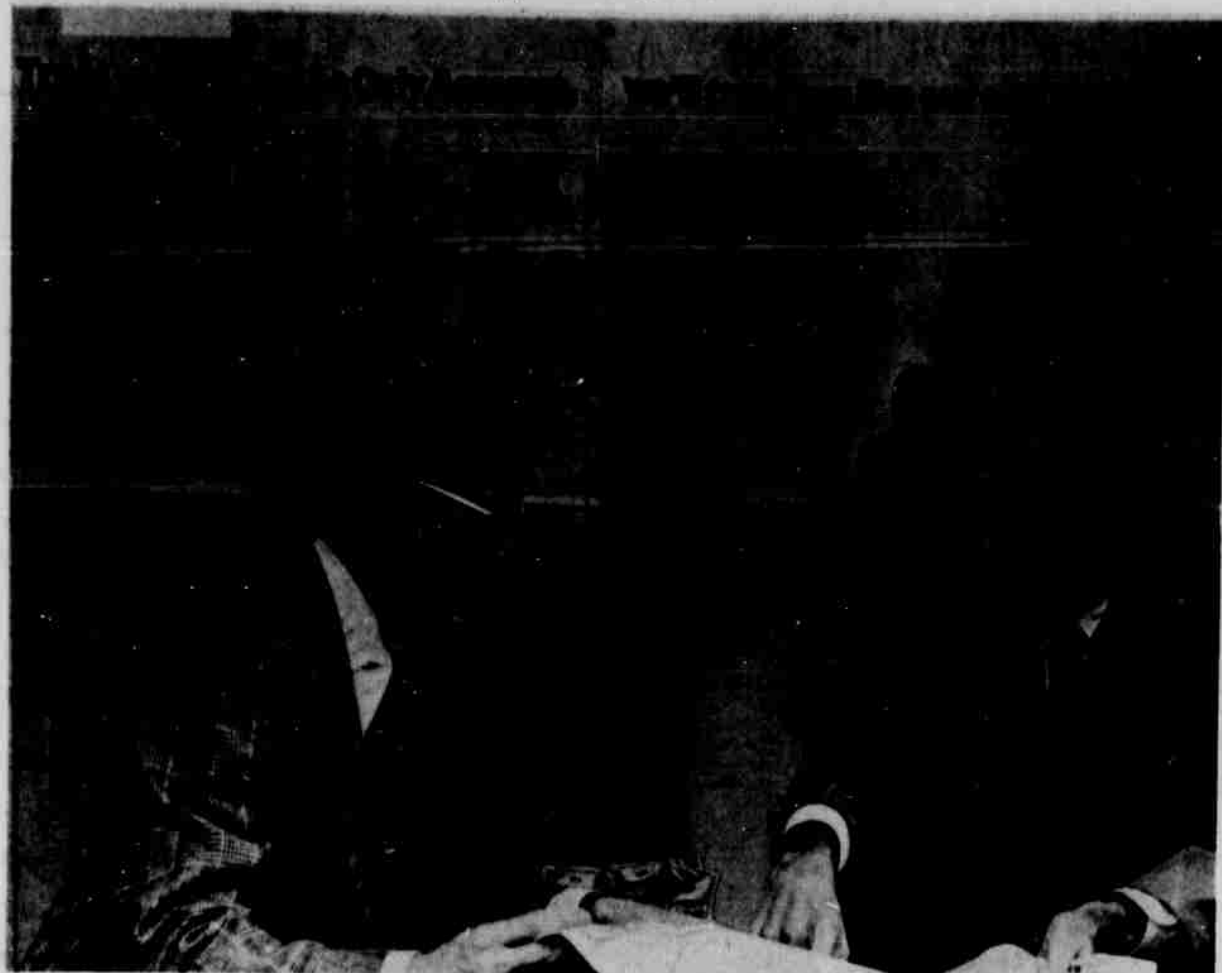

Hunting club license is suspended

The Oregon Wildlife Commission on Nov. 2 suspended the outdoor club license of Adventure Unlimited.

Adventure Unlimited is a Portland-based corporation which leases recreational access to private properties for the benefit of club members.

The 1973 legislature enacted an "outdoor club" law which assigned a consumer protection role to the Oregon Wildlife Commission. The commission is required to investigate and license such operations for the protection of both potential members and cooperating landowners.

Adventure Unlimited's failure to provide a required audited financial statement was the cause of the license suspension. The suspension of license precludes further promotion or sale of memberships until adequate evidence of financial stability is provided.

Of considerable concern to some local hunters is that the outdoor club has been leasing Umatilla National Forest land and in turn leasing it to Adventure Unlimited. Local sources say the club then charges up to \$30 a gun for hunting on the government land.

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Dr. Oscar Borg dies at 91

Dr. Oscar Borg, 91, late of Portland, died in Portland, Saturday, Nov. 9.

Graveside services were held Nov. 13 at 11 a.m. at Heppner Masonic Cemetery with the Rev. Mark Johnson of the Hope Lutheran Church officiating. Sweeney Mortuary was in charge of arrangements.

Oscar Borg was born in Heppner, Ore., June 17, 1883, the son of Anna Anderson and Peter Olson Borg, a pioneer watchmaker, jeweler and farmer in Morrow County.

Dr. Borg was married to Elsie McCarty of Heppner in 1909. He was a watchmaker and optometrist in Heppner, having attended Bradley Horological School in Peoria, Ill., and the Oregon School of Optometry. The Borg home was destroyed in the devastating fire that burned several blocks in Heppner on July 4, 1918. In 1921 the Borgs moved to Missoula, Mont., where he was associated in business with his brother, Frank Borg. They later moved to Portland where he was an optometrist for many years

until his retirement.

At the time of his death, Dr. Borg was the oldest member of Heppner Lodge AF&AM No. 69. He had served the lodge as worshipful master in 1909 and 1910 and was chairman of the building committee at the time the present Masonic Hall in Heppner was constructed. His Masonic membership spanned a period of 70 years. Dr. Borg's wife preceded him in death in 1971. Surviving are a nephew, Dr. Frank Borg, Missoula, Mont.; a niece, Katherine Borg of Palo Alto, Ca.; and a nephew, Cecil Wright, California. Heppner relatives of Mrs. Borg are Muriel Runnion, Elaine George and LaVerne Van Marter Jr.

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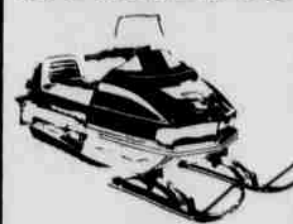
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
