

Services held for Richard T. Meador

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Methodist Church for Richard Thomas Meador, who died Saturday at Pioneer Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Meador was born May 1917 at Saint Jo, Tex. A resident of Heppner for the past 29 years, he was engaged in the earth-moving contracting business. He was a veteran of the U.S. Air Force in World War II, and was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion posts and the Heppner Elks Lodge.

Survivors are the widow, Inez, Heppner; his mother, Mrs. Enis Meador of Saint Jo, Tex.; two daughters, Leslee Meador, Pendleton, and Tami Meador, Heppner; two brothers, Harold Meador of Arlington, Tex., and Earl Meador of Fort Worth, Tex.; and a sister, Mrs. Freda Latham, Bowie, Tex.

The services were conducted at 3 p.m. Tuesday with Rev. Edwin Cutting officiating. Vault interment was in the Masonic Cemetery, Heppner. Military graveside services were conducted by the Heppner American Legion post.

Phase 2 contract signed

The City of Heppner and contractor Ray Kinney, Ontario, put Phase 2 of the city's water improvement plan in motion when they signed the contract papers Thursday.

Kinney plans to have the job on the jobsite by Dec. 2, and to start installing 6- and 8-inch mains the following day.

Installation of the remainder of the 6-inch and 8-inch mains are scheduled for Dec. 16, with plans for the majority of the mains installed by Dec. 24.

The related work on pump-houses 4 and 6 should be completed by mid-January with most of the electrical work completed by the end of the month.

At present, the contractor hopes to have all mains installed and trenches covered with plant mix by April, 1975.
