Money shortage pinches county road department

A meeting of the Morrow County Court and the county road commissioners was held last Wednesday to assess the financial status of the road department for the remainder of the fiscal year.

According to Doc Sherer, roadmaster, the roads are all in pretty good condition for the winter, with all of the roads receiving the necessary repairs and oil during the summer, with the exception of

Butter Creek. Butter Creek Road requires hot plant mix, and none of the plants are mixing any hot mix at present.

"There are 1080 miles of roads in the county and of these 368.5 miles are oiled, and we have to maintain these roads with a smaller crew than we had 10 years ago," continued Sherer. "At present there are three men working on blades, four assigned to roadwork, a shop repairman

and myself." Judge Paul Jones, chairman, said, "If we don't have a severe winter, with the roads freezing, we may be in good shape in the spring. But if we have a hard winter and we are faced with many repairs, we will have to take a long hard look at the budget."

Speaking on the monies spent thus far in the new fiscal year, and the defeat of the serial levy last May by the

voters, Jones said, "We are facing a serious situation with the roads in the county, and if we have a severe winter some of the roads may not get plowed."

The price of asphaltic oil used by the county has jumped from \$35 to \$70 per ton.

When the snows start the county crews will be down to only nine men, including Sherer. These men will have to take care of the roads in the Boardman-Irrigon area, run the rock crusher, cut trees, burn slashings, install any culverts, sand roads and keep the snow plow working.

The county plans to hire two men to round out the crews, in hopes of being able to take care of all of the work in the future.

In other business the county asked court permission to sell

some of its surplus equipment as a means of raising funds.

With the sale of some trucks and pickups, plus other items the county might raise an additional \$15,000. However, this money could not be used until the next fiscal year, after it has been placed in the budget.

An estimate for repairs and overhaul for the county's D-7 Caterpillar tractor, used in the rock quarry, is under way at an estimated cost of \$25,000 to \$28,000. The tractor being repaired at the county shop needs a new rear end, transmission, complete motor overhaul and new tracks and rollers.

Top spy was living model

Pauline Winter reviewed the autobiography of Dusko Popov at the joint meeting of Ione's Topic Club and Heppner's Bookworms on Nov. 12 at St. Patrick's Church.

This true account of Popov's years as a master spy during World War II is more compelling than most spy novels. "Tricycle" to the British, "Ivan" to the Germans, he is reputedly the model Ian Fleming used for James Bond.

Popov entered the twilight world of espionage when Hitler's troops were marching through Europe and he realized that only a concerted effort on the part of freedom-loving men could stop the menace of Fascism.

Posing as an admirer of the Nazis, Popov managed to gain their confidence and in time rated as their top spy. He then began passing on German information to British Intelligence. Popov's value to the British as a double-agent was not, however, appreciated by America's FBI.

When he was sent to the U.S. by the Germans, his welcome was less than cordial. "They need not trust me right away just because the British say that I'm OK," he said to his

friend, Ewen Montagu of British Intelligence, "but they are so stupid. Microphones everywhere and so obviously when I bend over to smell a bowl of flowers, I scratch my nose on a microphone."

American readers will be shocked to read of his encounter with J. Edgar Hoover and of Popov's giving advance notice of the intended bombing of Pearl

Harbor—which Hoover chose to disregard.

After his wartime missions were completed, Popov married and now lives happily in France. This 1974 book, published by Crosset and Dunlap, New York, sells for \$7.95. It is one of the new books put into circulation at the Heppner Public Library through gifts in memory of former Library Board Chairman Bill Siewert.
