Capt. James Cook exhibit extended

Since July 1 the Oregon Bicentennial Commission and the Oregon Historical Society have been presenting an international exhibition commemorating the three voyages of Captain James Cook.

The closing date was announced as Dec. 31—but has been extended until through Jan. 4.

Among others from the county who have viewed the exhibit, Helen Currin and Justine Weatherford spent a large part of the afternoon of Dec. 19 there.

Thirty-two museums throughout the world have contributed to this international showing. Cook materials from the principal museums in the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Russia and several in the United States collaborated.

The exhibition is a highlight of the 101st year of the Oregon Historical Society; it commemorates the Cook Bicentennial as well as serving as a kickoff event for the American Revolution Bicentennial.

Among the artifacts and pictures, 215 cataloged items, in this large collection which the Morrow County women found interesting were a series of large oil paintings by outstanding artists, including one by Thomas Gainsborough, and one by Sir Joshua Reynolds.

An Oregon item, some cutlinks of Captain Cook has this background. They were thought to have been presented by Cook's widow to his elder brother who was the great-uncle of Mary Offutt McBride, grandmother of Mrs. Albert Powers, Oregon City, who gave them to the historical society.

Many original maps and charts, sketches and drawings of islands, and drawings of the various ships as well as original equipment used on the three voyages are included in the exhibit which is housed on the ground floor of the Historical Society's headquarters on West Park Avenue in Portland.

Cook's first remarkable around the world trip began in 1768. His second voyage ended in 1775, and after a very short rest he left Plymouth on July 12, 1776, on his last great trip. It was on this voyage that he discovered the Hawaiian Islands, and in 1778 he sighted the Oregon coast naming four points of land, two of which have become part of our heritage—Cape Foulweather

and Cape Perpetua. Cook sailed north to Vancouver Island and the Bering Strait, but as winter approached he returned to the Hawaiian Islands, and there, on Feb. 14, 1779, after a series of misunderstandings and crises with the hitherto friendly natives, he was killed by a group of enraged islanders.

Sacred selections, "Near to the Heart of God" and "Going Down the Valley" were sung.

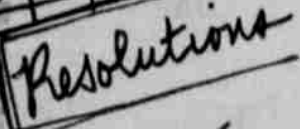
by Selma Adams, Carolyn and Marie Britt, accompanied by Carolyn Britt. Prelude and postlude music was played by Betty Marquardt.

WHO MAY ENROLL? Any adult regardless of age, previous schooling or experience, may enroll in any class offered by Blue Mountain College.

MINIMUM ENROLLMENT: To insure that a class operates on an economical basis, a minimum of 10 persons is required for a class to be offered. If a class is canceled, students may transfer or have fees refunded.

WHAT IS THE COST? Fees vary according to type and length of class. All tuition and fees are payable at the time of registration. No student is enrolled in class until all fees have been paid. Refunds are not made after the second class period.

HOW TO ENROLL? Students may enroll the first class session except in those classes requiring pre-registration. Registration for classes held on the Blue Mountain Campus will be done in the Admissions Office during the first class meeting. Students registering for all off campus classes may enroll, pay fees, and purchase books at the first class meeting. Late registration may be accepted through the second week of classes.

CAMPUS SERVICE: The College Bookstore stocks both required and supplementary textbooks. The library is open Monday through Thursday evenings for student use. The Snack Bar in the Student Union, is open on all class nights from 7-8 p.m.
