Clara Kincaid reaches 100

Clara Kincaid, Morrow County's oldest pioneer, celebrated her 100th birthday at Pioneer Memorial Hospital Monday.

She was born at Rhea Creek, Jan. 6, 1875, one of the daughters of Joseph and Augusta Mason. Granny Kincaid, as she is called today, was one of 10 children, five brothers and four sisters, born to the Masons. Today, a

brother, Joe Mason, Portland, and a sister, Mabel Cotter, Good Samaritan Center, Hermiston, are all that remain of the pioneer family.

As a youngster, Clara attended the Old Liberty School house at Rhea Creek. In 1900 she and John Oliver Kincaid were married, and in 1911 a son was born to them on Christmas Day. Harold Oliver, their only son, died in

1941, the victim of polio.

The Kincaids took to farming, and John sold insurance and Clara made wedding gowns for many of the people in the area, in addition to her regular duties of making bread and feeding the men during harvest time.

Clara managed the ranch until 1964-65, then at the age of 90, she spent most of the winter months in the hospital, and the summers with her grandsons.

She has four grandsons, Roger, Ralph, Lindsay and Lyle, and 10 great-grandchildren.

Clara Kincaid was 100 years old Monday, Jan. 6, and became the oldest Morrow County resident.

But down in Prineville another woman with strong ties to Morrow County celebrated her 100 birthday on Sept. 22. She is Mrs. Anna

Sumner, mother of Cal Sumner of Heppner.

Mrs. Sumner was born on a cattle ranch at Willow Creek, near Grizzly, Sept. 23, 1874, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Harlan Garrett, who migrated there in an ox-drawn wagon.

In October, 1897, she married Thomas Y. Sumner, a cattle rancher who also operated freight lines between Shaniko and Lakeview. He later became the station agent at Shaniko, and he and Mrs. Sumner operated the old Shaniko Hotel, which is still a thriving business.

They raised five children: Cal Sumner, Heppner; Madge Wyman, Prineville; Florence Harper, Eugene; and Mrs. Gladys Donnelly, San Carlos, Ca.

Mrs. Sumner's family planned a reception at the Prineville Community Church on Sept. 22 to allow hundreds of friends to visit her. She has 12 grandchildren, 38 great-grandchildren and 12 great-great-grandchildren. Only six great-grandchildren were unable to attend the celebration.

All of Mr. and Mrs. Cal Sumner's children were present: Jack Sumner and children; Mr. and Mrs. Paul N. Hansen, Heppner; Mr. and Mrs. Tom Sumner and family, Arlington; Mr. and Mrs. Jim Sumner and family, The Dalles; Mr. and Mrs. Michael Krenk and Jay Sumner, Malibu, Cal. Heppner's American Legion Commander Grace Steers and its Legion Auxiliary President Evelyn Sweek head two busy groups.

Minimum wage up

Norman O. Nilsen, state labor commissioner, has reminded employers that the minimum wage for all employees covered under the Oregon Minimum Wage Law will be \$1.75 an hour beginning Jan. 1, 1975. This includes minors under 18 years of age.

Employers are also reminded that time and one-half times the regular rate of pay must be paid for all hours worked over 40 in one work week to adults over 18 years of age. Minors under 18 years of age must receive overtime pay for all hours worked over in a day, and over 40 hours in one work week, Nilsen said.
