NOTICE OF BOND SALE

SEALED bids will be received by the undersigned until 5:00 o'clock P.M. on the 20th day of January, 1975, at the office of the Town Recorder in the City Hall of Lexington, Oregon, and immediately thereafter publicly opened, in the Council Chambers at said City Hall, for the purchase of an issue of Bonds of the Town of Lexington, Morrow County, Oregon, in the aggregate principal amount of \$145,000.00 par value. The proceeds of the Bonds will be used to acquire, construct, repair, extend and improve the water system of said Town of Lexington, Oregon. The Bonds are to be in the denomination of \$145,000.00 each, dated October 1, 1975, or the date of delivery at the option of the purchaser, and shall bear interest at the rate not to exceed 5 percent annum, payable semi-annually on January 1 and July 1, beginning January 1, 1975.

The Farmers Home Administration has agreed to purchase the Bonds if no acceptable bid is received. In the event the Farmers Home Administration purchases the Bonds, or any portion thereof, the Bonds so purchased may be in the form of one or more installment Bonds and shall bear such dates and be issued in such principal installments as the Town Council may hereafter provide by Ordinance.

Said Bonds will be sold to the highest responsible bidder and for not less than their par value and the entire amount of accrued interest thereon, and to the bidder offering the lowest effective interest rate to the Town, taking into consideration and account such premiums as are offered by the bidder in connection with the purchase of the Bonds, with interest being computed to the respective maturity dates. The bid must contain a statement of the net interest cost under the terms of the bid.

PN Bell office near completion

Construction of an addition to Pacific Northwest Bell's community dial office on Chase St. is nearing completion. Says PNB Manager Dale Shuster.

McCormack Construction Co. of Pendleton has worked on the project since mid-November. PNB assigned it to McCormack after the construction company turned in a low bid of \$45,785.

Other companies involved in the public bidding were E. E. Steinhilf of Bend with a bid of \$48,700; Ray Kenny Construction Co. of Ontario with \$57,400 and Holmes & Egan General Contractors of Salem with \$60,790.

Highlighting the exterior of the expanded building will be a two-toned beige painted design featuring bold geometric lines and a symbolic bell, Shuster says.
