New minister is from California

The Rev. Ed Sikes will give his thirteenth sermon Sunday at the Heppner Christian Church.

He came to Heppner from Sodusburgh, N.Y., where he had been with the Christian Church for 10 years. Before that he served churches in California for 23 years. He replaces the Rev. G. E. Nikolaier.

Rev. Sikes grew up in Ceres, Cal., and attended the College of Sequoia in Visalia and Northwest Christian College in Eugene. He completed his work at Northwest Christian in 1936.

Mrs. Sikes, who has been busy getting them settled into the Heppner parsonage on Gale Street, is also a Californian. She grew up in Fresno, and attended the same two colleges her husband did.

Rev. and Mrs. Sikes have three grown children. A son is in Fresno, Cal., a daughter at Everett, Wa., and another daughter is serving as a missionary in Homer, Alaska.

Rev. Nikolaier and his wife, Mary, were honored at the Heppner Christian Church last Sunday evening with a farewell party arranged by the congregation. Church members from Lexington also attended.

Rev. Nikolaier has served both of these Christian churches since Rev. Don Johnson left the county. He will continue to minister the church at Lexington.

Kinzua man is top forest operator

Don Hardwick of Hardwick Logging, Kinzua, has been named Eastern Oregon Forest Practice Operator of the Year by the Oregon State Board of Forestry.

The Operator of the Year Award, the first of its kind to be sponsored by the board, recognized Hardwick as the forest operator who best implemented Oregon's forest practice rules in Eastern Oregon in 1974.

All forest operators active in Eastern Oregon last year were eligible for the award. Hardwick was judged tops for his total performance in reforestation, road construction, harvesting operations and disposal of slash. Hardwick employs 12 people and logs an average of 10 million board feet per year.

Hardwick who works in some severe terrain conditions, was recognized for his extreme care when logging around springs and fish-bearing streams, his use of buffer strips to protect aesthetic values and his outstanding effort in slash disposal.

Presentation of the award was done by Board of Forestry Chairman Carl Stoltenberg at the Jan. 8 board meeting in the State Forester's Office, Salem. The award was mounted on a slice of a ponderosa pine, the principal Eastern Oregon species.

The award will be an annual one, designed to recognize an outstanding operator and demonstrate a model standard to meet Forest Practices Act regulations.

Log truck damaged

Richard A. Bryan, 50, Pendleton, was slightly injured at 5:50 a.m., Jan. 15, when his empty logging truck went out of control and overturned on Highway 207, three miles north of Lexington.

Bryan was treated at Community Hospital, Pendleton, and released. The truck, owned by Harris Pine Mills, Pendleton, was badly damaged. About 100 feet of barbed wire fence belonging to Pat Cutsforth was torn down by the truck when it skidded on an ice-covered curve and went into the barpi.

Bryan was cited by State Police for failure to maintain reasonable control of a motor vehicle.
