The Lone Cardinals defeated the Umapine Chiefs Saturday night, 58-29, at the Lone High School gymnasium.

Although the Cards will record the win in the Big Sky Conference, it was an easy victory. The Chiefs had only seven players, and of these three are only 5'3" tall. Two of the Chiefs "mighty mites," Brian Key, who played the entire game, and Joe Estes, who played almost the entire game, managed to give the Cards trouble throughout the game. Both these youngsters are fast, and at times were able to steal the ball. But, when they had the ball they had trouble in passing it. In fact, they had trouble in bounding the ball.

Most of the points scored by the Chiefs were baskets made by either Mike Maurer, 6'4", or Bob Fuller, 6', or Dave Lesser, 5'8" tall.

This was a sportsmanship-like game with the Cards playing every player on the roster and the Umapine Chiefs showing a lot of spunk against overwhelming odds.

In the first period the Cards scored 12 points while holding in the Chiefs to 2 points. In the second period the Chiefs scored 1 point, and the Cards scored 14, and as the half ended the score was 26-19 in favor of lone.

In the third period the Chiefs went into a slump while the Cards managed to hit, with the Cards easily outscoring the Chiefs, 16-2, making the third period score 42-21. In the final period the Cards scored another 16 points while holding the Chiefs to 8.

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The Heppner Mustangs overcame a last minute 8-point lead by Weston McEwen here Friday night to tie up the game at 55-all, and still lost the game.

With 2:39 seconds left in the final quarter, a foul proved costly to the Mustangs, who lost 62-59 in the waning seconds of play.

The Scots got off to a fast start in the first quarter and were able to take advantage of the turnovers. The Scots led 16-9 at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter was dominated by the Scots as they scored 16 points to the Mustangs, 13, and ended the half, 32-31, Scots.

Arbuckle won't open

The Arbuckle Ski Resort will not be operated this year according to Dick McElligott.

The decision not to operate the run stems from a shortage in qualified ski patrolmen. McElligott said the National Ski patrol has raised its standards in first aid training, and ski patrolmen who have served in the past are now unqualified and cannot meet the new standards in the time available. Ski patrolmen are a condition of the resort's use permit.

The ski club can still operate by going to Spout Springs, McElligott said, where lessons can be obtained. This policy will be carried out during February and March, with transportation by private car. All members are required to purchase accident insurance prior to the first trip.

Volunteers are still needed to drive the skiers, but the club will pay for group lessons. 4-H skiers will furnish their own equipment, food and tow tickets. T-bar cost is \$4.

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Rockets lose close one to Mustangs

The Heppner Mustangs, ahead by 5 points with only 12 seconds left in the game, had to settle for a 71-69 win over the Pilot Rock Rockets, Saturday night at the Rockets gymnasium.

After gaining the 5-point lead the Rockets took the ball and rolled the ball inbounds, down the court, holding the clock to the precious time left in the game. The ball was picked up and the Rockets scored, narrowing the Mustangs lead to 3 points. An inbound pass by the Mustangs was stolen by the Rockets, good for another 2 points and narrowing the lead to a single point. An attempt to steal the ball from the Mustangs after inbounding the ball again gave the Mustangs two free throws with no time left on the clock and leading by 1 point. The first shot was missed and the second basket was good, giving the Mustangs a 2 point win over the Rockets.

It was a close game all the way with the Mustangs leading the Rockets by 3 points at the end of the first quarter, 17-14.

In the second quarter the Rockets came back and the half ended with the Mustangs trailing 33-32.

The Mustangs poured it on in the third quarter and led the

Rockets 53-48 at the end of three periods of play.

The fourth quarter was even until the last few seconds, and the game could have gone either way. The Mustangs played heads up ball until the final seconds and pulled the game out of the fire.

John Kilkenny was high point man for the Mustangs with 22 points, followed by Ken Eckman with 12, DeWayne McClain 11, Dave McLachlan 7, Clayton Wilson 6, Wade Padberg and Jerry Gentry 4 each, Dave McLeod 3 and Clay West 2.

For the Rockets it was R. Kopp with 20, Strong 4, Hadd 2, Crumpacker 10, Ron Kopp 5, Lemons 4, Norquist 4, Rice 12 and Beers 8.

The Mustangs hit 24-57 from the field for 421 while the Rockets hit on 27-67 for 402. From the free throw line the Mustangs hit on 23-43 for .534 with the Rockets shooting 15-28 for .535.

The Mustangs outrebounded the Rockets 40-36, with Kilkenny getting 18 off the boards, McLeod 10 and West 9. The Mustangs had 24 turnovers to the Rockets 14.
