Take a few steps to conserve heat, save on fuel costs and stay warmer during the cool weather ahead.

1. A lot of warm air can disappear through an idle fireplace. Check to see that your fireplace damper closes tightly.
2. Turn the thermostat down no more than 10 degrees at night. If the house is too cold in the morning, your furnace will have to work overtime to bring the temperature back up to normal, expending fuel unnecessarily and wasting a precious resource—your money.
3. Thermostat jiggling is inefficient and expensive. Find a setting as low as possible for comfort and leave it there. If you feel chilly, put on a sweater—your furnace will automatically re-start soon.
4. Because heat rises, it pays to keep this warm air circulating at all times. Your furnace probably has a feature that allows you to operate the fan continuously. Use it.
5. Exhaust fans in the kitchen or bathroom should be used only when needed. Don't waste warm air by running continuously.
6. Let warm air circulate freely through your home. Furniture, draperies or carpets blocking registers cost extra fuel dollars. Re-arrange furniture if need be. It's worth it.
7. Window shades and drapes act as insulation. Close them on dark days and at night. On bright days, keep your drapes open to get maximum benefit from the winter sun's warming rays.
8. If you sleep with the windows open, shut bedroom registers and close the door. Little-used rooms are heat wasters. Close the registers and shut the doors.
9. Clogged dust filters on your furnace restrict the efficient flow of warm air. You can clean or replace these easily yourself.
10. Cracks and gaps around windows and doors create drafts which draw off warm air quickly. Seal with caulking and weather stripping to reduce heat loss. Storm sash and storm doors will save even more. In addition make sure that your attic is adequately insulated. It's recommended that at least 4 inches of insulating material be used.
11. Homes without basements should be checked carefully. In the crawl space below the house, insulate the exposed warm air ducts to prevent heat loss.
12. For peak efficiency, your oil furnace should be serviced at least once a year.
